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Purpose/Objective

This policy provides:

- guidelines to ensure children, staff and volunteers are well protected from overexposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun
- information for parents/guardians, staff, volunteers and children regarding sun protection
- guidance to the use of outdoor spaces, including adequate shading.

This policy will apply whenever the sun's UV levels reach three or higher. Whenever this occurs, a combination of sun protection measures are to be used for all outdoor activities.

Scope

This policy applies to the approved provider, staff, contractors, students on placement, volunteers, parents/guardians, children and others attending the programs and activities of Council Early Years Services, including during offsite excursions and activities.

Background/Reasons for Policy

Overexposure to the sun's UV radiation can cause sunburn, skin and eye damage and skin cancer. Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world.

Children up to four years of age are particularly vulnerable to UV damage, due to lower levels of melanin and a thinner stratum corneum (the outermost layer of skin). UV damage accumulated during childhood is associated with an increased risk of skin cancer later in life.

A combination of sun protection measures (hats, clothing, sunscreen, shade and sunglasses) is recommended whenever UV levels are three or higher during daily sun protection times (refer to Definitions). In Victoria UV levels are usually three or higher from mid-August to the end of April.

Active outdoor play is encouraged throughout the day all year, provided appropriate sun protection measures are used when necessary.

It is a requirement under the *Occupational Health and Safety Act 2004* that employers provide a healthy and safe environment for all persons who access the service's facilities and/or programs.



Legislation that governs the operation of approved children's services is based on the health, safety and welfare of the children, and requires that children are protected from hazards and harm.

Gender Impact Assessment

In accordance with the Gender Equality Act 2020, a Gender Impact Assessment was not required in relation to the subject matter of this policy.

Definitions

Term	Definition
Enrolment Record	The approved provider must ensure that an enrolment record is kept for each child enrolled at the service. The record must include details as outlined in the National Regulations (Regulations 102, 160–162)
Clothing for sun protection	Clothing that is loose-fitting, made from cool, densely woven fabric and covers as much skin as possible: tops with elbow-length sleeves and, if possible, collars and knee-length or longer shorts and skirts. Singlet tops and shoestring tops/dresses do not provide adequate protection in the sun.
Daily sun protection times	Times when it is estimated that the sun's UV radiation level will be three or higher. Information about the daily sun protection times is available in the weather section of the daily newspaper, online at <u>myuv.com.au</u> , or via a free <u>SunSmart app</u> .
Shade	An area sheltered from direct and indirect sun, such as a large tree, canopy, veranda or artificial cover. Shade can be built, natural or temporary and can reduce overall exposure to the sun's UV by 75%. Use surfaces that reflect less UV, e.g. natural, dark or rough surfaces Research shows that kindergarten environments with trees, shrubbery, and broken ground not only provides better sun protection in outdoor play but also triggers more physical activity.



Sunhat	SunSmart recommends the use of broad-brimmed or bucket-style hats (at least 5cm brim for young children) or legionnaire hats (make sure the front peak and back flap overlap at the sides) that shade the face, neck and ears. Caps and visors offer little protection to the cheeks, ears and neck, and are not considered a suitable sunhat.
Sunglasses	Sunglasses are optional. If worn, it is recommended that glasses are a close fitting, wrap-around style that meet the Australian Standard 1067 (Sunglasses: Category 2, 3 or 4) and cover as much of the eye area as possible. Wearing a hat with a brim that shades the eyes can also reduce UV radiation to the eyes by 50%.
Sunscreen	SPF 30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen. Sunscreen should be reapplied every two hours, even when labelled four hours water resistance. Monitor the expiry date and store in a cool, dry place. Cancer Council recommends a usage test before applying a new sunscreen. From three years of age, children are encouraged to apply their own sunscreen, under supervision of staff, to help develop independence skills ready for school.

- regularly seek feedback from educators, staff, parents/guardians, children, management and all affected by the policy regarding its effectiveness
- monitor the implementation, compliance, complaints and incidents in relation to this policy
- keep the policy up to date with current legislation, research, policy and best practice
- revise the policy and procedures as part of the service's policy review cycle, or as required
- notify stakeholders, including parents/guardians, at least 14 days before making any significant change to this policy or its procedures unless a lesser period is necessary due to risk (*Regulation 172 (2)*).
