Our submission is for the Macedon Ranges Council to consider upgrading the tennis courts 5-6 and courts 7-8 to be included in the 2024/25 Budget.

The club has engaged club has engaged to perform a Tennis Club facility assessment as part of our overall planning process for future facility upgrades. have provided a detailed facility report as part of their engagement and this report has been attached as part of our submission to Council, see attached "231030 SFAT Report - Resource of the council of the counci

The Redacted due to Privacy Reasons was formed in 1895 is one of the largest tennis clubs in the Macedon Ranges Region. The club is affiliated with and participates in the Redacted due to Privacy Reasons) competitions. The and our Club are affiliated with Redacted due to Privacy Reasons.

The Redacted due to Privacy Reasons a total of 8 tennis courts, all with lighting facilities. Courts 1-2 and Courts 3-4 are in good condition, however Courts 5-6 and Courts 7-8 are in very poor condition rating as per assessment performed by

Plaggel 9 of 295

Courts 5-6 and Courts 7-8 are subject to flooding and are unsafe to play on during the winter months and any wet days due to mould / mud. These courts are in a very poor state and have drainage issues. Out of our 8 courts in total at the only 4 of the club courts are available for play due to the very poor condition for Courts 5-6 and Courts 7-8.
The Club is currently required to hire courts from other clubs for our home games for Junior competition on Saturday mornings and Open competition on Thursday nights as we have strong participation but only have playing 4 playable courts.
The club have engaged as per commendations who are an experienced court designer and builder to provide our club with the information on the scope of works to fully refurbish Courts 5-6 and Courts 7-8.
The Macedon Ranges Council will require the necessary staffing resources (Detailed Design, Project Managers etc) to assist with the overall refurbishment of these tennis Courts 5-6 and 7-8.
Please find attached the estimate cost of works totalling \$AUD 1.35 million including 15% contingency as part of the initial assessment from for the design and scoping work required to be carried out on the upgrade to these existing courts, "02-Budget Redacted due to Privacy Reasons Rev A.pdf". We have also included the functional design as attached in this e-mail to provide further details on the redevelopment of these courts, "01-Residual due to Privacy Reasons Courts 5-8 Redevelopment - Functional Design - Rev A.pdf".
We are hoping these works can be completed within a 6-month timeframe once the project is fully approved.
request funding to be considered for the Macedon Ranges 2024/25 Budget and has direct links to the Community Vision as outlined in 2021.
The upgrade to Courts 5-6 and Courts 7-8 will provide for our local community to play competitive as well as social tennis at our club. The refurbishment of these courts will allow and encourage better collaboration supporting our local community and growth through tennis. This infrastructure upgrade will also allow local schools with a clear pathway to promote sport and recreation activities for school kids that will encourage them to be more involved in sport and the community. Our tennis club welcomes players of any age, we have juniors, seniors, ladies tennis, and mixed open competitions catering for all abilities to play tennis.
Club is an essential part of Gisborne's growing need for sport and recreation. Our Tennis club wants to provide better facilities to attract more members and promote healthy lifestyle for the community. The upgrade of these courts will not only provide better recreational facilities but also provide social and mental health benefits for the community. Over the years we have seen a decline in our membership. We are looking to reinvigorate our membership through this upgrade project to Courts 5-6 and Courts 7-8. It is important that this project gets the funding as it safeguards our Club and provides more opportunity for the local community to play tennis at our venue, which in turn will promote greater participation in sport, recreation, and social interaction in the community.
Our Redacted due to Privacy Reasons also sees a number of impacts of only having half of our courts available for the Gisborne community and on his coaching business. The availability of having only 4 courts not only limits his ability to attract new students but represents a lost opportunity for the Club to build its membership base and thus ensure

a sustainable community asset that helps keep community members active and socially connected. Our coach is selfemployed, and the business is not only his primary form of income but also the primary form of income for two

Our current transition to the Book-a-court system will promote better accessibility to our courts and with the refurbishment improvements, this will have the ability to attract more visitors to utilise the courts and generate

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employees.

Club would like Council to consider our request for an upgrade to these courts as this investment will bring long term benefits to both the Gisborne and wider Macedon Ranges community as outlined in our submission.

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Overall venue recommendation(s)

Courts 1 - 4 are in good condition, however courts 5 - 6 are in very poor state and have drainage issues. All courts will be professionally groomed before the end of 2023 and how courts 5 - 8 take and respond to grooming will provide a good indication of the possible life left in the artificial grass surface.

Courts 5 - 8, while the artificial grass is compacted and very dirty, seem to have a reasonable height of grass fibre remaining. If these courts can be cleaned properly, and the silt/algae then managed, it's possible some time could be bought to plan for a full refurbishment of 5 - 8. Of the four courts, the surface of 5 & 6 would seem to be at greatest risk, given it's showing signs of significant wear, seam splitting and has ageing baseline patches.

Given the problems across the four courts (base instability, drainage, low lying ground) a simple replacement of the artificial grass, without a full assessment and possible rectification/replacement of the underlying base, is not recommended. Planning for the future of these courts should include investigation of the most appropriate surface and pavement (as on courts 1 & 2, where a concrete base was installed) and on ways to improve drainage and mitigate the negative impact of water, both on the surface and under the base.

Consultation with an experienced court designer and builder (a) would provide the club with information on the scope and cost of works to fully refurbish courts 5 - 8, and allow the club to open discussions with council on support and funding opportunities.

Please note a submission has been submitted online, however I wanted to send photos of our courts additionally.

I am writing to you to make you aware of the current plight of the Club and our desperate need for the re-surfacing of our main three courts. In all honesty, all of our courts need re-surfacing. Our courts continue to deteriorate and have now reached the point that we fear they are not of acceptable standard for competition play. Currently we are transferring our Redacted due to Privacy Reasons

Thursday night matches to Lancefield's courts because of their state.

Our synthetic grass courts have a number of surface issues. Firstly, the synthetic grass is wearing thin and tears are occurring. We have already patched our baseline area on our first court. On our second court there is a major tear on the northern baseline and there are many other areas wearing thin. Secondly, our main three courts are extremely dirty, due largely to a loose base underneath the surface. These dirty patches are spread throughout our main three courts with several extremely bad patches. This problem multiplies whenever there is rain on our courts. The dry patches become muddy and our club volunteers have to work on shovelling the mud off the courts to make play possible. This makes our courts unattractive to play on but, more importantly, the courts become extremely slippery, whether wet or dry, making competition play extremely dangerous. Thus, we are faced with the stresses of whether or not to allow competition or social play on our courts. Recently, two players lost their footing during competition play, including myself. I sustained a back muscle injury, while another player was uninjured luckily. We are fearful we won't be so lucky next time. Additionally, moss is growing on our courts. While our courts deteriorate, we fear having to shut down our courts for junior tennis, social tennis and coaching lessons.

In recent years, the Club has worked extremely hard to rebuild after the effects of Covid. We have changed our coaching organisation, held Open Days, offered special memberships and worked with Tennis Australia to supply new tennis racquets to all Foundation students at receive to Privacy Reasons Our junior coaching numbers have increased from single figures to approximately 40-50 children. We have also attracted new members to our Club. We have always aimed to make tennis a viable option in Romsey. This is close to becoming impossible. The prospect of closing our courts is becoming a reality. We have considerable savings, however nowhere near enough to re-

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surface our courts. We are applying for grants, wherever possible, and have reached out to all levels of government. We have also received a commitment from the Redacted due to Privacy Reasons for \$20,000. We know that the MRSC have strategic plans for the re-surfacing of our 5 courts at the Club, however we are concerned when, and if, this may become a reality. In addition, the fencing around our courts is sub standard and in need of replacement. We have endeavoured to answer important questions also.

Will your idea need design or scoping work to be done? – We don't believe so, but are seeking professional guidance and quotes

Will your idea require Council staff or other human resources to deliver it? No, outside companies will complete the work

Will there be significant costs? We have received two quotes for synthetic grass re-surfacing. They vary greatly from \$108,000 to \$300,000. We are sourcing other quotes.



The Redacted due to Privacy Reasons appreciates the opportunity to provide a submission regarding the Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC) 2024-25 budget process. We request that funding be set aside in the 2024-25 budget to complete planning work to deliver a detailed design and cost for the first stage of the endorsed Ross Watt Master Plan.

has engaged extensively with MRSC officers and councillors over the past 12 months regarding the Ross Watt Master Plan. The Ross Watt Reserve Master Plan, endorsed by MRSC in September 2023, confirms Ross Watt Reserve as the permanent and long-term location for tennis courts in New Gisborne. The master plan outlines the urgent improvements required for the existing courts to remain viable in the short term and the staged development to include up to eight new tennis courts, clubhouse and general reserve improvements. Now is the time for all stakeholders to work together to move the endorsed Ross Watt Master Plan beyond an idea.

The first stage of the master plan addresses the pressing need to replace the two courts that are beyond their useful life with new tennis courts. The representatives are working hard with MRSC officers on the supported project to place lights on Courts 1 and 2. This project allows the tennis venue to remain viable in the short term as the existing lit Courts 3 and 4 are no longer playable.

The club is grateful for the support provided by our ward councillors so far. Whilst the Courts 1 and 2 lighting project is essential, it is time to develop plans to replace Courts 3 and 4 in line with the endorsed Ross Watt Reserve Master Plan.

, located behind Ross Watt Reserve on Station Road, has experienced a steady increase in membership over the past few years, with 75 members currently. These members consist of both senior and junior players who enjoy tennis for social recreation and to represent in various summer and winter competitions.

Coaching, trains around 100 children of all ages throughout the year. During the winter, the competition matches and coaching sessions rely on lighting. Unfortunately, the inability to use the lit Courts 3/4 is a significant constraint. The Courts 1 and 2 lighting project is essential to maintain the viability of coaching and night competitions at the venue. However, reducing the facility from four courts to two also significantly constrains the ability to grow tennis participation. The endorsed Ross Watt Reserve Master Plan clearly outlines the investment needed in the NGTC facilities for the club to remain viable.

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is a community club that values inclusivity. Our policies reflect our commitment to providing all members with a welcoming and inclusive environment. We strive to create an atmosphere where everyone feels valued and encouraged to participate in activities. Tennis is a sport that has a strong tradition of equal gender participation, and our club is proud to have a female representation of approximately 50% across all levels, including children's coaching, junior and adult competitions, memberships, and the committee. Please find below my submission for the 2023/2024 budget.

#### Feedback on the Budget Process

I would firstly just like it to be noted that I object to the submission process that closes on 20 November 2023 being the <u>only</u> formal consultation process Council is running on this budget (as per words on this web page <a href="https://www.mrsc.vic.gov.au/About-Council/News/Have-Your-Say/Budget-202425-and-Council-Plan-2021-2031-Year-Four">https://www.mrsc.vic.gov.au/About-Council/News/Have-Your-Say/Budget-202425-and-Council-Plan-2021-2031-Year-Four</a>).

This implies Council will not formally be advertising for or accepting submissions on a draft budget prior to it being presented to Councillors for approval.

How will Council know if the money it proposes to spend reflects community expectations?

Having a draft budget to comment on is distinctly different from this process, in essence an idea gathering exercise. Whilst Council may (and should) take on what the community have submitted in the past month, it could equally add additional items that do not meet community expectations, and yet claim the community was consulted!

It would be appropriate and consistent with Local Government Act 2020, especially ss9(1) and (2)

- (b) priority is to be given to achieving the best outcomes for the municipal community, including future generations
- . (d) the municipal community is to be engaged in strategic planning and strategic decision making
- . (g) the ongoing financial viability of the Council is to be ensured; and
- (i) the transparency of Council decisions, actions and information is to be ensured,

for Council to provide for a formal process for the community to comment on a draft budget, not just an opportunity to provide ideas.

#### **Budget Submission**

## 1. Walkability in Riddells Creek

I fully support the following community identified walkability (walking, cycling, horse riding) projects:

A. A pedestrian/cycling/horse bridge over Riddells Creek north of the Carre Riddell road bridge. This will connect Riddell to the shared trail that will come from New Gisborne, Macedon and Woodend and provide for better access to the south side of the actual Riddells Creek and to the Nursery and Early Learning Centre. It will help make it safe for pedestrians, horses and cyclists to exit and enter the town. Placing it north of the Carre Riddell road bridge will ensure it serves not just the shared trail but

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community desire to access the south side of Wybejong Reserve and beyond. Further a connection south of Carre Riddell road bridge can be provided as part of a connection under the rail line, via the creek course, to the Riddell South development (as is shown in the developers latest plan).

- B. A shared path on Sutherlands Rd, from Racecourse Rd to the Lions Park. This will provide safe walking from Rangeview Estate into the town centre, and for walkers, runners and dog walkers doing a circuit.
- C. A shared path on Southbourne Rd, from Parkview Terrace to Racecourse Rd. Parents and kids will be safer getting to and from the playground on Parkview, or getting out to Main Road and Sutherlands Road.

A. is a big budget item that needs design work started now, not when the trail is at Riddell's doorstep. B. and C. can be done now, and will make the existing path network better connected on two of the most popular routes the community uses every day.

- D. **Safe crossing points.** Pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders should be able to cross Main Rd safely and conveniently from Walter J Smith to Amess Rd. They should not have to travel further to reach a crossing point. Safe crossing points, be they refuge crossings, wombat crossings or pedestrian operated signals, should be provided at (immediate high priority shown in bold):
  - 56 Main St to Walter J Smith Reserve
  - · Immediately east of Bolithos Rd
  - Riddells Creek Primary School Crossing
  - 126 Main Rd / Immediately East of Memorial Drive
  - Gap Rd / Richardson St
  - Amess Rd / Sandy Creek Rd
  - East of Sandy Creek / Dry Creek (around the Dromkeen driveway)
- E. **Safe speeds.** The safety of non-vehicle road users can be significantly enhanced by implementing safe speeds in Riddells Creek, including (but not limited to):
  - Frost Lane to Filmer Place: 60km/h
  - Filmer Place to Riddell Rd: 40km/hr
  - Riddell Rd to Rivergum Rd: 60km/h
  - Rivergum Rd to Williams Lane: 80km/hr.
- F. Recommended speed signage where there are no footpaths in at least the area bounded by Melvins Rd, Whittakers Lane, Gap Rd and Main Rd, i.e. yellow signs indicating 20km/h past pedestrians, cyclists and horses.
- G. Provide for horses on the shared trail from Gisborne to Riddells Creek.
- 2. Other

#### A. Masterplan for Riddells Creek Lions Park

Fund a process to develop a plan for the Lions Park to be developed over several years into something like Woodend Children's Park, Romsey Ecotherapy Park or Galaxy Land Park (Sunbury).

## B. Gisborne Pool Re-development

Redevelop/extend the Gisborne pool, and at least:

- add two extra lanes to the 25m pool;
- add an indoor children's splash pad (like Oak Park Pool or Peninsula Aquatic Centre);
- add further family change rooms; and
- refresh the existing family changes rooms (eg. paint, door stops that work, continuous ventilation) [this item can and should be done independent of the above items]

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- C. Signage for Murnong Creek, Riddells Creek. Funds for name signage for Murnong Creek (ex Riddells Creek Main Drain) at prominent locations.
- D. A process to plan for Riddells Creek. When Councillors rejected Amess Rd they said they would plan for Riddells Creek's future. This needs to start asap and it needs to be a process that, e.g.:
  - · co-designed with the community
  - is community lead/puts community at the centre to plan for Riddells Creek; provision/funding of a community advocate who answers to and works to a community working group could be a way
  - addresses both Riddells' growth areas in a holistic way, i.e. as a whole with the existing township, not on their own as is happening at the moment
  - addresses the planning controls in the existing township so the neighbourhood character as identified in previous strategic planning/framework work can be enforced
  - identifies and ensures sequencing of infrastructure, services and other needs as the town grows.

Thank you for taking the time to read and consider my submission. I look forward to the ideas being carried forward in the budget 2024/25, and the community being presented with a <u>formal</u> opportunity to comment on the draft budget 2024/2025.

Dear Councillors and Council Staff,

What Riddell Wants Infrastructure Strand is part of the group What Riddell Wants, a community organised project setting the agenda for the long-term development of Riddells Creek.

The Infrastructure Strand supports the What Riddell Wants budget submission (emailed earlier this evening by me).

However, given the extensive work we have done between September and November this year, and the importance of walkability to the Riddells Creek Community as demonstrated by our work, we have also chosen to do a walkability specific budget submission.

### Walkability in Riddells Creek

As a group our work (in short analysis of Council's *Riddells Creek Network Movement Study* and resident survey) shows the following are high priority projects for the Riddells Creek community, and as such should be funded in the 2024 / 2025 budget.

- A. A pedestrian/cycling/horse bridge over Riddells Creek north of the Carre Riddell road bridge. This will connect Riddell to the shared trail that will come from New Gisborne, Macedon and Woodend and provide for better access to the south side of the actual Riddells Creek and to the Nursery and Early Learning Centre. It will help make it safe for pedestrians, horses and cyclists to exit and enter the town. Placing it north of the Carre Riddell road bridge will ensure it serves not just the shared trail but community desire to access the south side of Wybejong Reserve and beyond. Further a connection south of Carre Riddell road bridge can be provided as part of a connection under the rail line, via the creek course, to the Riddell South development (as is shown in the developers latest plan).
- B. A shared path on Sutherlands Rd, from Racecourse Rd to the Lions Park. This will provide safe walking from Rangeview Estate into the town centre, and for walkers, runners and dog walkers doing a circuit.
- C. A shared path on Southbourne Rd, from Parkview Terrace to Racecourse Rd. Parents and kids will be safer getting to and from the playground on Parkview, or getting out to Main Road and Sutherlands Road.

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A. is a big budget item that needs design work started now, not when the trail is at Riddell's doorstep. B. and C. can be done now, and will make the existing path network better connected on two of the most popular routes the community uses every day.

Further to the above high priority projects the following also appear in the Top 10 list of Projects and are also worthy of funding in 2024 / 2025:

- D. **Safe crossing points.** Pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders should be able to cross Main Rd safely and conveniently from Walter J Smith to Amess Rd. They should not have to travel further to reach a crossing point than a block or so. Safe crossing points, be they refuge crossings, wombat crossings or pedestrian operated signals, should be provided at (immediate high priority shown in bold):
  - 56 Main St to Walter J Smith Reserve
  - Immediately east of Bolithos Rd
  - Riddells Creek Primary School Crossing
  - 126 Main Rd / Immediately East of Memorial Drive
  - Gap Rd / Richardson St
  - · Amess Rd / Sandy Creek Rd
  - East of Sandy Creek / Dry Creek (around the Dromkeen driveway)
- E. **Safe speeds.** The safety of non-vehicle road users can be significantly enhanced by implementing safe speeds in Riddells Creek, including (but not limited to):
  - Frost Lane to Filmer Place: 60km/h
  - Filmer Place to Riddell Rd: 40km/hr (we encourage the Council to consult the community on this particular aspect)
  - Riddell Rd to Rivergum Rd: 60km/h
  - Rivergum Rd to Williams Lane: 80km/hr.
- F. **Recommended speed signage where there are no footpaths** in at least the area bounded by Melvins Rd, Whittakers Lane, Gap Rd and Main Rd, i.e. yellow signs indicating 20km/h past pedestrians, cyclists and horses.

Further we strongly encourage Council to:

G. Provide for horses on the shared trail from Gisborne to Riddells Creek.

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#### 1. Introduction

#### Focus on Riddells Creek welcome

The Riddells Creek community welcomes the focus on Riddell via the *Riddells Creek Movement Network Study* (the Study). The Draft Recommendation Report has provided an excellent jumping off point from which the What Riddell Wants community group has based its further work.

The Infrastructure Strand of 'What Riddell Wants' wants to build on the momentum of Macedon Ranges Shire Council's (MRSC or Council) Study so that we see some actual allocation of funds and the commencement of physical works, rather than more reports and strategies. We want intentions turned into actions. We want to encourage the Council to love Riddells Creek a bit more, and start taking action to enhance its village feel.

## 2. Why focus on walkability and the current situation in Riddells Creek

Riddells Creek suffers from some key drawbacks in respect of movement.

#### Vehicular traffic dominates

Movement in Riddells Creek is dominated by vehicular traffic on the main roads, much of which is busy through traffic, as well as the impacts of vehicles coming and going from residences. This has a major negative impact on non-vehicular movements, e.g. those on foot (including those using mobility aids), cyclists (of any type) and horse riders.

#### Non-vehicular traffic is locked in

Of the several main road 'gateways' into our town, all present dangerous squeeze spots where would-be pedestrians are forced into dangerous proximity to fast moving vehicular traffic (often heavy vehicles). None of these gateways are currently safe for pedestrians, cyclists or horse riders. So at present, rather than gateways, these locations are effectively barriers. See Appendix A to this document for an expansion on these gateways as barriers.

#### Discontinuous non-vehicular routes

To the extent that paths do exist, they are often discontinuous, sometimes ending abruptly midstreet. As a result, people are discouraged from walking or cycling.

#### Missed health and social benefits

Due to the aforementioned residents of Riddells Creek are missing out on the health benefits of walking and the sense of well-being and opportunity for increased social connections that comes with being outside and interacting in public space with other residents.

## Use of the term walkability

Note that throughout our work and community engagements we have used the term "Walkability" as a simple headline tag, to focus the attention of community responders on what we want to achieve in considering the Study. However, 'Walkability" is not intended to be limited to pedestrians, but rather to encompass all forms of non-vehicular people movements in Riddells Creek. That is it applies to all types of pedestrians –functional and recreational – all types of cyclists and, in some places, horse riders.

## 3. Our process & inputs

The Council Engineers have reached out to key community groups and asked that they provide feedback on priority projects based on these groups' specific local knowledge. 'What Riddell Wants' Infrastructure Strand has gone beyond this and sought input from the Riddells Creek community.

'What Riddell Wants' Infrastructure Strand undertook the following to arrive at four Priority Route/Areas for improving walkability for the town as a whole. We have:

- Reviewed and analysed the Riddells Creek Movement Network Study (the Study) in detail
- Conducted a resident survey<sup>3</sup> asking where they walk or would like to walk, and ideas for improvements
  - 74 online responses, 7 verbal responses at the 16 Sept. 2023 Farmers' Market,
     (n. 81) = 256 comments on how to improve walkability<sup>4</sup>
  - 50% of respondents had not heard of the Riddells Creek Network Movement Study
- Collated the data from the resident survey to,
  - identify the Priority Route/Areas, and therein,
  - the projects required to deliver over time these Priority Route/Areas as coherent wholes
- Undertaken detailed discussion and analysis of all of the aforementioned within the What Riddell Wants Infrastructure Strand and with the Riddells Creek Planning Group<sup>5</sup>.

In this document, wherever possible, we refer to the item number of the 97 Projects listed in Appendix 2 of the Study.

## 4. Adopting a holistic view that will result in a coherent whole

#### Movement Study's Approach

The Study determines network classifications/maps for a number of modes of movement, for example walking, cycling and vehicles. This part of the Study is considered a holistic approach.

The Study then conducts a gap analysis which results in a list of 97 projects. That list, while nearly complete, does have a few omissions and inaccuracies which we rectify in our feedback and priority recommendations below.

At this point in time the 97 projects do not appear to be ordered or prioritised in a way that will result in delivery of a coherent whole.

Further, while the use of multi-criteria analysis is understandable in the context of the need to prioritise, in itself it will not lead to projects which are funded leading to a coherent whole.

#### What Riddell Wants Proposed Approach

## A holistic focus on routes

We propose that the above can be addressed by examining and understand what routes:

- the community values the most; and therein
- which projects (from the Study or the resident survey) enable these.

In essence individual projects can then be considered as components of a particular route. Thus, in the first two instances, we have considered what  $\underline{routes}$  we believe should be the priorities (Section 6). Then within these routes we have also identified the key enabling projects/components (included in Section 6, details in Appendices C – F).

A key reason for considering <u>routes</u> is that Riddells Creek currently has little non-vehicular people movement infrastructure (pavements etc.). But what there is, is mostly discontinuous and does not present coherent, continuous <u>routes</u> that promote connectivity.

Consideration of <u>routes</u>, has enabled us to employ both a top-down strategic view as well as a bottom up consideration of individual projects.

## Cost vs Impact on Connectivity

Routes will contain elements that are both higher cost as well as those that are low cost, yet both types can combine to make a whole route more functional and attractive. For example, shared foot bridges across creeks to permit safe passage around dangerous squeeze spots will be more costly, but high value in improving walkability. They are essential to several of the most popular routes becoming safe and welcoming for the whole town, pedestrians and cyclists.

Changing vehicular speed restrictions and adding pedestrian crossings or refuges will be much lower cost, but are still important elements that, together, make a route work. This should be remembered in any project ranking in which some critical enabling elements, which might be more expensive projects, are ranked higher, but the other lower cost elements fall lower in the ranking. All contribute to the total route such that the sum is greater than the total of the parts.

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#### Alignment with major council initiatives

We have also considered the need to connect these priority routes with important longer-term Council projects. Mainly, at the western entry to the town, this is the connection to the Woodend to Riddells Creek Shared Trail. At the eastern end of town, we have also borne in mind the longer-term potential for ultimately creating a long-distance cycling/walking route from Riddells Creek to Romsey via the Kilmore Rd which would further promote cycling and bicycle tourism as a recreational drawcard to Riddells Creek and the broader region.

#### Balancing 'in town' vs 'out of town'

We have been mindful of the need to balance the needs of residents living closer-in to the town centre, with the desire to also create longer routes through the town which connect to the natural features of the area or locally significant tourist or retail destinations.

Thus, one of the routes we have also identified is an area closer-in to town, that should receive priority attention as this will serve pedestrian needs in the higher density living areas, where there are a higher proportion of residents needing to use mobility aids as well as parents with prams accessing shops, the school and so forth.

This creates a desirable overlap of some projects contributing both to the two longer priority routes and the 'in town' higher density living area, such that the two approaches to prioritisation are complementary.

## 5. How can Council use the Walkability Priorities?

The identified Walkability Priorities can be used to improve Riddells Creek by being:

- incorporated into the Multi-criteria Analysis (with a significant weighting),
  - i.e. Does the project contribute to the communities Walkability Priorities as determined by the work of What Riddell Wants Infrastructure Strand?; weighting 20%
- being adopted as clear direction to the Council in its capital works/budgeting across all Departments/projects, and its advocacy with State Government

When implementing these priorities, the Council should:

- Balance the needs of people living close to town, with those living further out from town. Not everything can be done at once, but all residents deserve a safe and enjoyable way to walk around their town.
- Provide paths that suit what the user needs. Mobility scooters and mothers with prams
  walking to the shops and town centre need concrete paths, but people who
  walk/run/cycle/dog-walk on longer routes may prefer a firm, well-drained gravel path. Many
  respondents to the resident survey said that that firm, wide gravel paths were more
  desirable beyond the town centre.
- Design paths that fit the character of each neighbourhood and preserve the environmental values of the town. Meandering paths moving around trees, instead of cutting them down, are as valuable as straight paths.
- Plan for routes, not sections. Discontinuous sections need to be linked up to make coherent routes. Addressing the dangerous squeeze spots at the several main road 'gateways' into the town should be an early consideration as they would be strategic 'enablers' for longer routes.

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## 6. The Walkability Priorities of Riddells Creek

## 6.1 Make Main Road a safe and welcoming place for pedestrians

Riddells Creek will have a public way along Main Rd/Kilmore Rd, running from Gyro Close, across Sandy/Dry Creek, linking in Dromkeen, through town, across Riddells Creek itself, and beyond towards Gisborne.

As a busy vehicular route, the Main Rd currently dominates the centre of Riddells Creek to the detriment of all other (potential) users. This whole stretch should be safe and enjoyable for all modes of pedestrian and cycling travel to move along the route and to cross it. What will achieve this?<sup>6</sup>

- Provide continuous wide pathways along each side of Main Road from Gyro Close to Melvins
   Rd
- Deal with the dangerous squeeze points where Main Road crosses Riddells Creek and Sandy/Dry Creek (a shared bridge for pedestrians and cyclists across Riddells Creek, near the Carre Riddell road bridge, was the mostly highly ranked project by residents).
- Plan for the connection of the Woodend to Riddells Creek Shared Trail Project into the centre of Riddells Creek; deliver connection by 2025 at latest in line with Shared Trail Project timelines
- Address the Main/Station/Sutherland junction, including creating pedestrian crossing points to make it safer for both pedestrians and vehicles.
- Calm the traffic by reducing entry speeds to the town and moving speed reductions farther out.
- Make it safe to cross Main Road at several key points. Crossing points should be regular and convenient for pedestrians to use.

## 6.2 Improve the north-south pedestrian thoroughfares of the town.

The resident survey shows Gap Road to Richardson to Southbourne, and Sutherlands Road to Racecourse Rd are important north-south routes residents use daily. They walk with prams, dogs and/or children on bicycles and scooters. They need to become thoroughfares that are welcoming, ease to use and safe. What will achieve this?<sup>7</sup>

## 6.2.1 Gap Road to Richardson to Southbourne

- Gap Rd recreational shared path Royal Parade to Whittakers Lane
- Gap Rd shared path, Whittakers Lane to Main Rd
- Main Rd crossing refuge at Gap Rd/Richardson St
- Upgrade existing footpath to shared path on Richardson Street
- Shared path on Southbourne Rd

#### 6.2.2 Sutherlands Road to Racecourse Rd

- Shared path along Sutherlands Rd, from the Lions Park to Racecourse Rd (equal 2<sup>nd</sup> mostly highly ranked project by residents, not identified in Study's list of 97 projects)
- Safe crossing point at Fitzgerald St or Stephen St
   (if delivered in between these two streets as per Project No. 88 a footpath must also be provided on the south side of Southbourne Rd linking Fitzgerald St and Stephen St)

## <u>6.3</u> <u>Footpaths and safe connections for people living close to or moving around the town centre.</u>

People walk into town and back from the higher density residential areas east of Whitakers Lane and west of Rangeview estate. They need continuous, high-quality footpaths: at present they have neither. What will achieve this?<sup>8</sup>

- To the NW of Main Rd, create/complete paved footpaths in the grid bounded by Main Rd, Melvins Rd, Gap Rd and Somerville Lane, including a shared pedestrian/cycle bridge over Murnong Creek on Somerville Lane.
- To the SE of Main Rd, create/complete paved footpaths in the area bounded by Main Rd, Sutherlands Rd, Rangeview Drive and Amess Rd. This includes a paved shared path on Racecourse Rd besides the Recreational Reserve which is not identified in the Project list of the Riddells Creek Network Movement Study. Or, at a minimum, completing the short unmade section on Racecourse Rd, between the existing concrete paved path near the junction with Richardson St, with the existing gravel path alongside the Recreational Reserve, which would be a very low cost 'quick fix'.

## 6.4 Enabling the recreational trails of the town.

Riddells Creek is a town for people who enjoy long walks, running and cycling. Shared trails will connect and open up the town to the green world around Riddell. Where should these shared trails be?<sup>9</sup>

- Along Dry Creek, from Amess Road to Sutherlands Road, including a bridge at Kathryn Court
- A complete path up to Royal Parade (Barrm Birrm Nature Reserve)
  - Gap Rd recreational shared path Royal Parade to Whittakers Lane
  - Gap Rd shared path, Whittakers Lane to Main Rd
- The circuit along Gyro Close, Sandy Creek Rd and cross connecting to Gap Rd at Plantation Rd
- The public reserves along Riddells Creek and Murnong Creek.

#### 8. What criteria should be used?

What Riddell Wants Infrastructure Strand have:

- reviewed the Movement Study's suggested assessment criteria to prioritise projects (refer to p50);
- reviewed the Microsoft Excel work sheet provided by Council Engineers, with an electronic file name '220073\_Riddells Creek MCA DRAFT\_230914.xlsm'; and
- provided Council Engineers with an amended version of the aforementioned Microsoft Excel worksheet, with an electronic file name '220073\_Riddells Creek MCA DRAFT\_230914\_WRW VERSION 1.1.xlsm'.

While the amended version of the Microsoft Excel worksheet has the bulk of feedback on the multicriteria analysis the following points are also provided:

- We encourage Council to avoid slavishly applying the multi-criteria analysis (MCA) to justify
  the project priorities and ensure it is used as a guide to rational thinking. That is once all
  projects have been put through the MCA consider the results in the context of creating
  coherent routes.
- Consider how such an analysis could be applied to routes as a whole.

#### Guide to our multi-criteria analysis feedback in the amended Microsoft Excel Sheet

In the Microsoft Excel sheet, we have:

- Suggested new weighting for the key performance indicators (KPIs) 'Arterial roads / rail
  corridors / non-Council land', 'Significant infrastructure', 'Aligns with relevant Council
  strategy' and 'Stakeholder support'.
- Broken the KPI 'Proximity to essential services' into three related but separate KPIs, including providing weightings, weighting guides, raw scoring guide and suggested source data.
- Added a new KPI, 'Addresses a Walkability Priority Route/Area', including providing weightings, weighting guides, raw scoring guide and suggested source data.
- For the Road Safety KPI provided an updated/suggested weighting guide and source data (changes marked in yellow and bold).
- Added a new column N (marked purple) to provide detailed comments, e.g. reasoning for our suggested changes or feedback on existing information in the Microsoft Excel sheet.

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## 9. Corrections to the Trafficworks Movement Network Study report

There are errors in the maps. These should be corrected before errors become embedded and accepted as a factual basis going forward (especially by those less familiar with the town).

The General Traffic Classification (p 17) is inaccurate. The area north-west of Gap Road is known as Barrm Birrm, has locked gates on the public roads and is to become a conservation reserve. This area should remain part of the Walking Classification (p 18), and become part of the Pedestrian Facilities map (p 45) as part of the walking network. The Place Classification also needs amending to fit this situation.

**The Walking Classification** (p 18) is inaccurate, and inconsistent with the Pedestrian Facilities map (p 45). Main Road from Gyro Close in the north to Rivergum Road in the south, and Sutherlands Road from Rangeview Estate to Main Road should each be rated as W2, because they are primary pedestrian routes. In addition, Gyro Close needs to be a higher classification than W5.

#### The Walking Hierarchy (p 30) is incomplete:

- Main Road walking route should be understood as one continuous route from Gyro close to beyond the Carre-Riddell bridge to Williams Lane;
- Sutherlands Road to Yellowgum, and Gap Road, are Primary Routes.
- Dry Creek, which has a streamside reserve and potential as a recreational trail south of Amess Road to Sutherlands and should be identified as such.
- Recreational trails identified along Sandy Creek and Murnong Creek are mainly on private land and will be difficult to turn into public routes. By contrast, Murnong Creek from Somerville across Whitakers Lane to Bolitho (as Wimbi Creek) is public reserve and could carry a recreational trail.
- Southbourne Road/Richardson Roads is a significant walking route that people use to move out to Main Road and should be a primary route.

**The Street Hierarchy** (p 26) is inaccurate. Sutherlands Road is a Main Activity Street at least to Rangeview Estate.

**General traffic (p17) and Freight classification (p19)**, should somehow identify the opportunity to create a long term by pass / alternate route to the south of Riddells Creek, e.g. from the Riddell Rd along the southern boundary of the Riddell South development area, along Suthersland Rd, along Amess Rd and east of the Amess Rd development site.

'Riddells Creek Town Centre Opportunities Summary' (p 55) describes a few important improvements that do not appear in the project list at Appendix 2 of the report. Pedestrian access out of and into town across the Creek is a major opportunity for the town centre but does not get mentioned.

A missing project is the section of Racecourse Road from Richardson St to Sutherlands Rd. There is a gravel path bordering the Recreational Reserve on the west side of Racecourse road in this section, but it lacks a connection to short sections of concrete paved path near Richardson. The aforementioned Riddells Creek Town Centre Opportunities Summary (p55) mentions an "Improved shared path treatment along the eastern side of Racecourse Rod", however neither appear in the projects list. Project 34 at Racecourse Rd only goes from Amess Rd to Southbourne Rd.

**Projects 72 and 76** (Speed restriction changes) appear to be duplicates.

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**Projects 40 & 41** (shared path on Gyro Close) both use an "Unnamed Rd" as start and end points. It is not clear where this location is, but in effect, this shared path is along the full length of Gyro Close and the projects can be considered as one. If the 'Unnamed Rd' is the unnamed <u>path</u> that is an existing cut-through on the easement between street numbers 149 and 173 on Gyro Close and numbers 130 and 138, then the two projects serve to distinguish two sections of shared path along Gyro Close and in that case, the section from Kilmore Rd should have the greater priority of the two.

**Project 42** (shared path on Gap Rd), has an incorrect road name as its start point and seems redundant. This start point cannot be Sandy Creek Rd as that road runs parallel to Gap Rd for its entire length. In any case the full length of Gap Rd is addressed by shared path projects 32 and 36 so project 42 could be redundant.

The criteria for assessment. There are no weightings for criteria (p 50), and no separate categories for pedestrians and cyclists. There should be a specific criterion for pedestrian use. 'Stakeholder and community sentiment' should include other matters raised in the comments that relate to general amenity in the town. 'Prioritise projects within Amess Creek development' in the criteria 'Alignment with local strategy and policy', is problematic as a criteria, given the lack of a PSP for the area and residents opposition to the development at its proposed density. *Refer also to section 8 of this report for detailed feedback on the multi-crtieria analysis.* 

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### Appendix A. Further Information on Town Entrances as Gateways or Barriers?

There are four or five 'gateways' to the centre of Riddells Creek township:

- 1. To the South, the main road to/from Sunbury as it passes under the bluestone rail bridge and at the T junction with the Main Road/Kilmore Road.
- 2. To the West, the main road to/from Gisborne (the Main Road/Kilmore Road) at the Carre Riddell road bridge over the Riddell Creek itself.
- 3. To the North-East, the main road to/from Monegeetta (the Main Road/Kilmore Road) where it is bridged over Dry Creek/Sandy Creek and at the foot of the blind crest over the hill to the NE.
- 4. To the East, on Sutherlands Road where it crosses Dry Creek.
- 5. To the North on Sandy Creek Rd (at approx. No.47 Sandy Creek Rd).

All of these gateways were raised as dangerous squeeze spots in the resident survey conducted.

Each of these gateways is a dangerous squeeze point for pedestrians, cyclists or horse riders. For example, to pass these locations a pedestrian has to be quick of foot, very alert, wait for gaps in the traffic and pass quickly along the very narrow or often non-existent verge.

If a pedestrian was caught in these squeeze spots when two large/heavy vehicles were passing in opposite directions at the same time, there is a great danger to the pedestrians simply because there is insufficient width. This is especially possible at the first three listed above, due to the heavier traffic at those locations. The risks are magnified greatly for those not fleet of foot, or unaware, or needing mobility aids, pushing a pram, or walking dogs etc.

The 'gateways' are satisfactory for vehicles (although they could clearly be improved), but **they are barriers for non-vehicle users**, and in particular for people living outside the higher density part of the town. They discourage people venturing into town on foot or by bicycle, and discourage those living inside from venturing further out by foot or bike etc. for walking recreation, dog walking, cycling, or to visit Dromkeen, Riddells Creek Nursery of the childcare centre etc. Dealing with squeeze points will do a lot to improve walkability in Riddells Creek.

Squeeze points need to rectified *before* improvement of the rest of routes into and out of Riddell. For example, improving the shared path along the existing wide and grassy verges on roads will add little value if a person on that route encounters a squeeze spot like that at the Sandy Creek/Dry Creek bridge on the Kilmore Road. Three of the four squeeze spots are created by road bridges over creeks, that can be rectified by the construction of separate pedestrian/shared footbridges. The exception is the bluestone rail bridge which poses a particularly challenging problem, especially if the Woodend to Riddells Creek Shared Path project is completed to the South of the railway line, alongside Markham Rd (which is one of its two alternate routes currently shown on the project's plans).





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## Walkability north of Main Road

No marked footpath up Gap Road - cars can travel down that stretch with speed and bends in the road make it difficult to see people walking on the road,, plus walkers may not see the cars coming in either direction. Plus some walkers walk on the wrong side of the road. It is important that walkers have safe access to Barrm Birrm and Royal Parade, plus it will encourage more people to go to this amazing asset. Solution: a gravel path on one side of Gap Road which is maintained, clearly signed and wide enough to take both bicycles and walkers.

South down Gap Rd, turn right into Main Rd and walk down to the shops/supermarket. No footpath on Gap Rd - we need a footpath.

> Bolithos road to Royal Parade. Very dangerous as uneven terrain. Grade the surface or bitumen road

The walking route up Melvin's, along Royal Parade and down Gap (or vice versa) is very popular. There is no pedestrian walking path along Gap Road and Melvins road and Gap Road in particular can be quite unsafe as the speed limit is high. Also there are blind spots. Pedestrian path added on Gap Road from Main Road to Royal Parade at a minimum.would ensure safety for all pedestrians. .

Erect recommended speed (20km/hr) signs where there are no footpaths, e.g. Melvins Rd, Merrifield St, Bolithos Rd, Gap Rd, Edward St and Sandy Creek Rd.

I would like to see Murnong Creek starting around Whittaker's Lane better utilized, with a walking track alongside it and cleared of weeds.

> North of Main Road. We just desperately need a footpath on all these streets (one side of the road would suffice)

> > A bridge-over landscape treatment that connects Sommerville across the creek

Or widen the road to share more easily...

I walk Gap Road a lot, which gets a lot of foot traffic. A footpath all the way up to Royal Parade would make a huge difference by getting pedestrians off busy Gap Road.

Main Road/Gap Road to Royal Parade/Gap.. There is no formed formal pathway, and many people walk on the sealed part of Gap Road, which is narrow and not wide enough for two vehicles and pedestrians. Even with one car, it is dangerous when cars traveling on Gap Road have to pass pedestrians. The section from the crest of the hill around 173 Gap Road is particularly dangerous, since walkers and cars cannot see each other ahead of when they pass. The solution is a formed track, gravel, on the verge. There is already a goat track uphill of Whittakers Lane, but it is narrow and only wide enough for one person. Existing track is narrow and carries water when it rains. With a gravel track wide enough for two people and a dog, which is a typical pedestrian configuration, people would get off the road and walk here.

Gap Road up to Barrm Birrm. Better walking path north of Whittakers Lane up to the corner of Gap Rd and Royal Parade. There is an informal track along the fence line (western side) which is great, but only goes part way and could be widened to make it more accessible (I do like how it is off the edge of the road)





### Walkability Gisborne end of town

Melvins Rd, through Wybejong Reserve, under the Kilmore Rd bridge, through the Lion's Park, along Station St. This route not usable in wet weather. Need a marked and maintained trail path through Wybejong Reserve; easier access to the stairs from this path to prevent slipping in wet weather (in other words, extend the stairs upwards to LEVEL ground rather than sloped so young children don't need to hold hands that even adults often can't spare); create a HIDDEN GEM by painting the area under the Kilmore Rd into an Australian Native themed mural rather than the ugly graffiti and bare concrete that is currently visible; improve the "stairs" leading to the lake in the Lion's Park (young children need to hold hands again), loose gravel is NOT ideal; create an extension to the path from Wybejong Reserve to go around behind the kindergarten and Neighbourhood House to Station St. Currently, NONE of this walk is viable in wet weather AT ALL - which is a good 5 or 6 months of the year. Earlier this year, I was diagnosed with TWO TORN TENDONS in my right ankle that will take two or three years to heal. I can't use this route at all now even in clear weather, yet it always felt safer to me than my Kilmore Road route, as it was the only "clean" and healthy way I could avoid crossing Kilmore Rd.

By the creek, there is no footpath between Rivergum Road and the town. If you live that side of Riddell you can't walk to the shop, or even out on the streets.

Riddells creek primary school to flour mill lane no safe footpath along Kilmore road to walk home. Busy 100km road no walk path . Kilmore road needs bike and footpath alongside railway line then could walk or bike into town safely

Juine Vers -

I have occasionally walked to the nursery, and which I would do so more frequently, but crossing the road bridge feels quite dangerous. A walking path with its own pedestrian bridge over the creek is essential for pedestrian safety. There has been a substantial increase in traffic over the bridge over the 35 years we have lived in Riddells Creek.

The bridge is too narrow to allow vehicles and pedestrians to use the bridge at the same time. The speed restriction to 70 km/hr increases the risk for pedestrians. Dedicated foot (and bicycle) bridges would allow safe movement over the creek.

Carre Riddell bridge is to dangerous to walk across. Needs a pedestrian/cycle/horse bridge (same with Sandy/Dry Creek at other end of town).

It would be great to walk over the bridge out of Riddell towards Gisborne.





### What Is What Riddell Wants?

What Riddell Wants is a community-organised project setting an agenda for the long-term development of Riddells Creek. Based on community input it has four strands, Infrastructure, Services, Environment and Social.

Each Strand has adopted a focus from the input of the community and is working towards practical improvements for Riddells Creek.

Further information on *What Riddell Wants*, including each Strand's current focus, is provided in Appendix A.

### **Budget Submission**

Based on the work of each Strand to date *What Riddell Wants* has constructed the following budget submission. Please note that this submission is not intended as a summary of each Strand work.

What Riddell Wants is calling on Council to fund the following in the 2024 / 2025 budget:

A. A pedestrian/cycling/horse bridge over Riddells Creek north of the Carre Riddell road bridge. This will connect Riddell to the shared trail that will come from New Gisborne, Macedon and Woodend and provide for better

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access to the south side of the actual Riddells Creek and to the Nursery and Early Learning Centre. It will help make it safe for pedestrians, horses and cyclists to exit and enter the town. Placing it north of the Carre Riddell road bridge will ensure it serves not just the shared trail but community desire to access the south side of Wybejong Reserve and beyond. Further a connection south of Carre Riddell road bridge can be provided as part of a connection under the rail line, via the creek course, to the Riddell South development (as is shown in the developers latest plan).

- B. A shared path on Sutherlands Rd, from Racecourse Rd to the Lions Park. This will provide safe walking from Rangeview Estate into the town centre, and for walkers, runners and dog walkers doing a circuit.
- C. A shared path on Southbourne Rd, from Parkview Terrace to Racecourse Rd. Parents and kids will be safer getting to and from the playground on Parkview, or getting out to Main Road and Sutherlands Road.
- D. Signage for Murnong Creek, Riddells Creek. Funds for name signage for Murnong Creek (ex Riddells Creek Main Drain) at prominent locations.
- E. Fund a project to scope the service needs of our older population and those with a disability in the Riddell community. The study would look at what gaps exist currently (especially now that Aged Services have gone to external providers earlier this year), what solutions could be activated by the community into the future and inform the Council where additional services are required. The study would also make some recommendations about what services are likely to be needed with population growth into the future. Estimated budget figure \$10,000.
- F. Fund a community notice board at the entrance to town with a town map and for notifying both community and visitors about Riddells Creek. This map and shelter would be the springboard for navigation through the town, including to Riddells Creek environmental destinations, open spaces and recognition that the First Nations people Wurrunjeri Woi Worrung are owners

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of land and waterways in Riddells Creek. An example of this can be found at the Romsey Library.

The town map/shelter would be supported by a visitors map which would be available at the notice board and also at the Neighbourhood House, Post office and other places so that visitors can navigate their way around town.

Budget estimate \$5,000.

Each of these projects align with the Community Vision 2021 – 2031, Council Plan 2021 – 2031, Financial Plan 2021 – 2031.

Thank you for taking the time to consider our budget submission. We look forward to inclusion of these ideas in the 2024 / 2025 budget.

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### 1. Introduction

### Focus on Riddells Creek welcome

The Riddells Creek community welcomes the focus on Riddell via the *Riddells Creek Movement Network Study* (the Study). The Draft Recommendation Report has provided an excellent jumping off point from which the What Riddell Wants community group has based its further work.

The Infrastructure Strand of 'What Riddell Wants' wants to build on the momentum of Macedon Ranges Shire Council's (MRSC or Council) Study so that we see some actual allocation of funds and the commencement of physical works, rather than more reports and strategies. We want intentions turned into actions. We want to encourage the Council to love Riddells Creek a bit more, and start taking action to enhance its village feel.

### 2. Why focus on walkability and the current situation in Riddells Creek

Riddells Creek suffers from some key drawbacks in respect of movement.

#### Vehicular traffic dominates

Movement in Riddells Creek is dominated by vehicular traffic on the main roads, much of which is busy through traffic, as well as the impacts of vehicles coming and going from residences. This has a major negative impact on non-vehicular movements, e.g. those on foot (including those using mobility aids), cyclists (of any type) and horse riders.

### Non-vehicular traffic is locked in

Of the several main road 'gateways' into our town, all present dangerous squeeze spots where would-be pedestrians are forced into dangerous proximity to fast moving vehicular traffic (often heavy vehicles). None of these gateways are currently safe for pedestrians, cyclists or horse riders. So at present, rather than gateways, these locations are effectively barriers. See Appendix A to this document for an expansion on these gateways as barriers.

#### Discontinuous non-vehicular routes

To the extent that paths do exist, they are often discontinuous, sometimes ending abruptly midstreet. As a result, people are discouraged from walking or cycling.

### Missed health and social benefits

Due to the aforementioned residents of Riddells Creek are missing out on the health benefits of walking and the sense of well-being and opportunity for increased social connections that comes with being outside and interacting in public space with other residents.

### Use of the term walkability

Note that throughout our work and community engagements we have used the term "Walkability" as a simple headline tag, to focus the attention of community responders on what we want to achieve in considering the Study. However, 'Walkability" is not intended to be limited to pedestrians, but rather to encompass all forms of non-vehicular people movements in Riddells Creek. That is it applies to all types of pedestrians –functional and recreational – all types of cyclists and, in some places, horse riders.

### 3. Our process & inputs

The Council Engineers have reached out to key community groups and asked that they provide feedback on priority projects based on these groups' specific local knowledge. 'What Riddell Wants' Infrastructure Strand has gone beyond this and sought input from the Riddells Creek community.

'What Riddell Wants' Infrastructure Strand undertook the following to arrive at four Priority Route/Areas for improving walkability for the town as a whole. We have:

- Reviewed and analysed the Riddells Creek Movement Network Study (the Study) in detail
- Conducted a resident survey<sup>3</sup> asking where they walk or would like to walk, and ideas for improvements
  - 74 online responses, 7 verbal responses at the 16 Sept. 2023 Farmers' Market,
     (n. 81) = 256 comments on how to improve walkability<sup>4</sup>
  - 50% of respondents had not heard of the Riddells Creek Network Movement Study
- Collated the data from the resident survey to,
  - identify the Priority Route/Areas, and therein,
  - the projects required to deliver over time these Priority Route/Areas as coherent wholes
- Undertaken detailed discussion and analysis of all of the aforementioned within the What Riddell Wants Infrastructure Strand and with the Riddells Creek Planning Group<sup>5</sup>.

In this document, wherever possible, we refer to the item number of the 97 Projects listed in Appendix 2 of the Study.

#### 4. Adopting a holistic view that will result in a coherent whole

#### Movement Study's Approach

The Study determines network classifications/maps for a number of modes of movement, for example walking, cycling and vehicles. This part of the Study is considered a holistic approach.

The Study then conducts a gap analysis which results in a list of 97 projects. That list, while nearly complete, does have a few omissions and inaccuracies which we rectify in our feedback and priority recommendations below.

At this point in time the 97 projects do not appear to be ordered or prioritised in a way that will result in delivery of a coherent whole.

Further, while the use of multi-criteria analysis is understandable in the context of the need to prioritise, in itself it will not lead to projects which are funded leading to a coherent whole.

#### What Riddell Wants Proposed Approach

#### A holistic focus on routes

We propose that the above can be addressed by examining and understand what routes:

- the community values the most; and therein
- which projects (from the Study or the resident survey) enable these.

In essence individual projects can then be considered as components of a particular route. Thus, in the first two instances, we have considered what  $\underline{routes}$  we believe should be the priorities (Section 6). Then within these routes we have also identified the key enabling projects/components (included in Section 6, details in Appendices C – F).

A key reason for considering <u>routes</u> is that Riddells Creek currently has little non-vehicular people movement infrastructure (pavements etc.). But what there is, is mostly discontinuous and does not present coherent, continuous <u>routes</u> that promote connectivity.

Consideration of <u>routes</u>, has enabled us to employ both a top-down strategic view as well as a bottom up consideration of individual projects.

#### Cost vs Impact on Connectivity

Routes will contain elements that are both higher cost as well as those that are low cost, yet both types can combine to make a whole route more functional and attractive. For example, shared foot bridges across creeks to permit safe passage around dangerous squeeze spots will be more costly, but high value in improving walkability. They are essential to several of the most popular routes becoming safe and welcoming for the whole town, pedestrians and cyclists.

Changing vehicular speed restrictions and adding pedestrian crossings or refuges will be much lower cost, but are still important elements that, together, make a route work. This should be remembered in any project ranking in which some critical enabling elements, which might be more expensive projects, are ranked higher, but the other lower cost elements fall lower in the ranking. All contribute to the total route such that the sum is greater than the total of the parts.

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#### Alignment with major council initiatives

We have also considered the need to connect these priority routes with important longer-term Council projects. Mainly, at the western entry to the town, this is the connection to the Woodend to Riddells Creek Shared Trail. At the eastern end of town, we have also borne in mind the longer-term potential for ultimately creating a long-distance cycling/walking route from Riddells Creek to Romsey via the Kilmore Rd which would further promote cycling and bicycle tourism as a recreational drawcard to Riddells Creek and the broader region.

#### Balancing 'in town' vs 'out of town'

We have been mindful of the need to balance the needs of residents living closer-in to the town centre, with the desire to also create longer routes through the town which connect to the natural features of the area or locally significant tourist or retail destinations.

Thus, one of the routes we have also identified is an area closer-in to town, that should receive priority attention as this will serve pedestrian needs in the higher density living areas, where there are a higher proportion of residents needing to use mobility aids as well as parents with prams accessing shops, the school and so forth.

This creates a desirable overlap of some projects contributing both to the two longer priority routes and the 'in town' higher density living area, such that the two approaches to prioritisation are complementary.

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#### 5. How can Council use the Walkability Priorities?

The identified Walkability Priorities can be used to improve Riddells Creek by being:

- incorporated into the Multi-criteria Analysis (with a significant weighting),
  - i.e. Does the project contribute to the communities Walkability Priorities as determined by the work of What Riddell Wants Infrastructure Strand?; weighting 20%
- being adopted as clear direction to the Council in its capital works/budgeting across all Departments/projects, and its advocacy with State Government

When implementing these priorities, the Council should:

- Balance the needs of people living close to town, with those living further out from town. Not everything can be done at once, but all residents deserve a safe and enjoyable way to walk around their town.
- Provide paths that suit what the user needs. Mobility scooters and mothers with prams
  walking to the shops and town centre need concrete paths, but people who
  walk/run/cycle/dog-walk on longer routes may prefer a firm, well-drained gravel path. Many
  respondents to the resident survey said that that firm, wide gravel paths were more
  desirable beyond the town centre.
- Design paths that fit the character of each neighbourhood and preserve the environmental values of the town. Meandering paths moving around trees, instead of cutting them down, are as valuable as straight paths.
- Plan for routes, not sections. Discontinuous sections need to be linked up to make coherent routes. Addressing the dangerous squeeze spots at the several main road 'gateways' into the town should be an early consideration as they would be strategic 'enablers' for longer routes.

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## 6. The Walkability Priorities of Riddells Creek

#### 6.1 Make Main Road a safe and welcoming place for pedestrians

Riddells Creek will have a public way along Main Rd/Kilmore Rd, running from Gyro Close, across Sandy/Dry Creek, linking in Dromkeen, through town, across Riddells Creek itself, and beyond towards Gisborne.

As a busy vehicular route, the Main Rd currently dominates the centre of Riddells Creek to the detriment of all other (potential) users. This whole stretch should be safe and enjoyable for all modes of pedestrian and cycling travel to move along the route and to cross it. What will achieve this?<sup>6</sup>

- Provide continuous wide pathways along each side of Main Road from Gyro Close to Melvins
   Rd
- Deal with the dangerous squeeze points where Main Road crosses Riddells Creek and Sandy/Dry Creek (a shared bridge for pedestrians and cyclists across Riddells Creek, near the Carre Riddell road bridge, was the mostly highly ranked project by residents).
- Plan for the connection of the Woodend to Riddells Creek Shared Trail Project into the centre of Riddells Creek; deliver connection by 2025 at latest in line with Shared Trail Project timelines
- Address the Main/Station/Sutherland junction, including creating pedestrian crossing points to make it safer for both pedestrians and vehicles.
- Calm the traffic by reducing entry speeds to the town and moving speed reductions farther out.
- Make it safe to cross Main Road at several key points. Crossing points should be regular and convenient for pedestrians to use.

#### <u>6.2</u> <u>Improve the north-south pedestrian thoroughfares of the town.</u>

The resident survey shows Gap Road to Richardson to Southbourne, and Sutherlands Road to Racecourse Rd are important north-south routes residents use daily. They walk with prams, dogs and/or children on bicycles and scooters. They need to become thoroughfares that are welcoming, ease to use and safe. What will achieve this?<sup>7</sup>

#### 6.2.1 Gap Road to Richardson to Southbourne

- Gap Rd recreational shared path Royal Parade to Whittakers Lane
- Gap Rd shared path, Whittakers Lane to Main Rd
- Main Rd crossing refuge at Gap Rd/Richardson St
- Upgrade existing footpath to shared path on Richardson Street
- Shared path on Southbourne Rd

#### 6.2.2 Sutherlands Road to Racecourse Rd

- Shared path along Sutherlands Rd, from the Lions Park to Racecourse Rd (equal 2<sup>nd</sup> mostly highly ranked project by residents, not identified in Study's list of 97 projects)
- Safe crossing point at Fitzgerald St or Stephen St (if delivered in between these two streets as per Project No. 88 a footpath must also be provided on the south side of Southbourne Rd linking Fitzgerald St and Stephen St)

# <u>6.3</u> <u>Footpaths and safe connections for people living close to or moving around the town centre.</u>

People walk into town and back from the higher density residential areas east of Whitakers Lane and west of Rangeview estate. They need continuous, high-quality footpaths: at present they have neither. What will achieve this?<sup>8</sup>

- To the NW of Main Rd, create/complete paved footpaths in the grid bounded by Main Rd, Melvins Rd, Gap Rd and Somerville Lane, including a shared pedestrian/cycle bridge over Murnong Creek on Somerville Lane.
- To the SE of Main Rd, create/complete paved footpaths in the area bounded by Main Rd, Sutherlands Rd, Rangeview Drive and Amess Rd. This includes a paved shared path on Racecourse Rd besides the Recreational Reserve which is not identified in the Project list of the *Riddells Creek Network Movement Study*. Or, at a minimum, completing the short unmade section on Racecourse Rd, between the existing concrete paved path near the junction with Richardson St, with the existing gravel path alongside the Recreational Reserve, which would be a very low cost 'quick fix'.

#### 6.4 Enabling the recreational trails of the town.

Riddells Creek is a town for people who enjoy long walks, running and cycling. Shared trails will connect and open up the town to the green world around Riddell. Where should these shared trails be?<sup>9</sup>

- Along Dry Creek, from Amess Road to Sutherlands Road, including a bridge at Kathryn Court
- A complete path up to Royal Parade (Barrm Birrm Nature Reserve)
  - Gap Rd recreational shared path Royal Parade to Whittakers Lane
  - Gap Rd shared path, Whittakers Lane to Main Rd
- The circuit along Gyro Close, Sandy Creek Rd and cross connecting to Gap Rd at Plantation Rd
- The public reserves along Riddells Creek and Murnong Creek.

#### 8. What criteria should be used?

What Riddell Wants Infrastructure Strand have:

- reviewed the Movement Study's suggested assessment criteria to prioritise projects (refer to p50);
- reviewed the Microsoft Excel work sheet provided by Council Engineers, with an electronic file name '220073\_Riddells Creek MCA DRAFT\_230914.xlsm'; and
- provided Council Engineers with an amended version of the aforementioned Microsoft Excel worksheet, with an electronic file name '220073\_Riddells Creek MCA DRAFT\_230914\_WRW VERSION 1.1.xlsm'.

While the amended version of the Microsoft Excel worksheet has the bulk of feedback on the multicriteria analysis the following points are also provided:

- We encourage Council to avoid slavishly applying the multi-criteria analysis (MCA) to justify
  the project priorities and ensure it is used as a guide to rational thinking. That is once all
  projects have been put through the MCA consider the results in the context of creating
  coherent routes.
- Consider how such an analysis could be applied to routes as a whole.

#### Guide to our multi-criteria analysis feedback in the amended Microsoft Excel Sheet

In the Microsoft Excel sheet, we have:

- Suggested new weighting for the key performance indicators (KPIs) 'Arterial roads / rail
  corridors / non-Council land', 'Significant infrastructure', 'Aligns with relevant Council
  strategy' and 'Stakeholder support'.
- Broken the KPI 'Proximity to essential services' into three related but separate KPIs, including providing weightings, weighting guides, raw scoring guide and suggested source data.
- Added a new KPI, 'Addresses a Walkability Priority Route/Area', including providing weightings, weighting guides, raw scoring guide and suggested source data.
- For the Road Safety KPI provided an updated/suggested weighting guide and source data (changes marked in yellow and bold).
- Added a new column N (marked purple) to provide detailed comments, e.g. reasoning for our suggested changes or feedback on existing information in the Microsoft Excel sheet.

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#### 9. Corrections to the Trafficworks Movement Network Study report

There are errors in the maps. These should be corrected before errors become embedded and accepted as a factual basis going forward (especially by those less familiar with the town).

The General Traffic Classification (p 17) is inaccurate. The area north-west of Gap Road is known as Barrm Birrm, has locked gates on the public roads and is to become a conservation reserve. This area should remain part of the Walking Classification (p 18), and become part of the Pedestrian Facilities map (p 45) as part of the walking network. The Place Classification also needs amending to fit this situation.

**The Walking Classification** (p 18) is inaccurate, and inconsistent with the Pedestrian Facilities map (p 45). Main Road from Gyro Close in the north to Rivergum Road in the south, and Sutherlands Road from Rangeview Estate to Main Road should each be rated as W2, because they are primary pedestrian routes. In addition, Gyro Close needs to be a higher classification than W5.

#### The Walking Hierarchy (p 30) is incomplete:

- Main Road walking route should be understood as one continuous route from Gyro close to beyond the Carre-Riddell bridge to Williams Lane;
- Sutherlands Road to Yellowgum, and Gap Road, are Primary Routes.
- Dry Creek, which has a streamside reserve and potential as a recreational trail south of Amess Road to Sutherlands and should be identified as such.
- Recreational trails identified along Sandy Creek and Murnong Creek are mainly on private land and will be difficult to turn into public routes. By contrast, Murnong Creek from Somerville across Whitakers Lane to Bolitho (as Wimbi Creek) is public reserve and could carry a recreational trail.
- Southbourne Road/Richardson Roads is a significant walking route that people use to move out to Main Road and should be a primary route.

**The Street Hierarchy** (p 26) is inaccurate. Sutherlands Road is a Main Activity Street at least to Rangeview Estate.

**General traffic (p17) and Freight classification (p19)**, should somehow identify the opportunity to create a long term by pass / alternate route to the south of Riddells Creek, e.g. from the Riddell Rd along the southern boundary of the Riddell South development area, along Suthersland Rd, along Amess Rd and east of the Amess Rd development site.

'Riddells Creek Town Centre Opportunities Summary' (p 55) describes a few important improvements that do not appear in the project list at Appendix 2 of the report. Pedestrian access out of and into town across the Creek is a major opportunity for the town centre but does not get mentioned.

A missing project is the section of Racecourse Road from Richardson St to Sutherlands Rd. There is a gravel path bordering the Recreational Reserve on the west side of Racecourse road in this section, but it lacks a connection to short sections of concrete paved path near Richardson. The aforementioned Riddells Creek Town Centre Opportunities Summary (p55) mentions an "Improved shared path treatment along the eastern side of Racecourse Rod", however neither appear in the projects list. Project 34 at Racecourse Rd only goes from Amess Rd to Southbourne Rd.

**Projects 72 and 76** (Speed restriction changes) appear to be duplicates.

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**Projects 40 & 41** (shared path on Gyro Close) both use an "Unnamed Rd" as start and end points. It is not clear where this location is, but in effect, this shared path is along the full length of Gyro Close and the projects can be considered as one. If the 'Unnamed Rd' is the unnamed <u>path</u> that is an existing cut-through on the easement between street numbers 149 and 173 on Gyro Close and numbers 130 and 138, then the two projects serve to distinguish two sections of shared path along Gyro Close and in that case, the section from Kilmore Rd should have the greater priority of the two.

**Project 42** (shared path on Gap Rd), has an incorrect road name as its start point and seems redundant. This start point cannot be Sandy Creek Rd as that road runs parallel to Gap Rd for its entire length. In any case the full length of Gap Rd is addressed by shared path projects 32 and 36 so project 42 could be redundant.

The criteria for assessment. There are no weightings for criteria (p 50), and no separate categories for pedestrians and cyclists. There should be a specific criterion for pedestrian use. 'Stakeholder and community sentiment' should include other matters raised in the comments that relate to general amenity in the town. 'Prioritise projects within Amess Creek development' in the criteria 'Alignment with local strategy and policy', is problematic as a criteria, given the lack of a PSP for the area and residents opposition to the development at its proposed density. *Refer also to section 8 of this report for detailed feedback on the multi-crtieria analysis.* 

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#### Appendix A. Further Information on Town Entrances as Gateways or Barriers?

There are four or five 'gateways' to the centre of Riddells Creek township:

- 1. To the South, the main road to/from Sunbury as it passes under the bluestone rail bridge and at the T junction with the Main Road/Kilmore Road.
- 2. To the West, the main road to/from Gisborne (the Main Road/Kilmore Road) at the Carre Riddell road bridge over the Riddell Creek itself.
- 3. To the North-East, the main road to/from Monegeetta (the Main Road/Kilmore Road) where it is bridged over Dry Creek/Sandy Creek and at the foot of the blind crest over the hill to the NE.
- 4. To the East, on Sutherlands Road where it crosses Dry Creek.
- 5. To the North on Sandy Creek Rd (at approx. No.47 Sandy Creek Rd).

All of these gateways were raised as dangerous squeeze spots in the resident survey conducted.

Each of these gateways is a dangerous squeeze point for pedestrians, cyclists or horse riders. For example, to pass these locations a pedestrian has to be quick of foot, very alert, wait for gaps in the traffic and pass quickly along the very narrow or often non-existent verge.

If a pedestrian was caught in these squeeze spots when two large/heavy vehicles were passing in opposite directions at the same time, there is a great danger to the pedestrians simply because there is insufficient width. This is especially possible at the first three listed above, due to the heavier traffic at those locations. The risks are magnified greatly for those not fleet of foot, or unaware, or needing mobility aids, pushing a pram, or walking dogs etc.

The 'gateways' are satisfactory for vehicles (although they could clearly be improved), but **they are barriers for non-vehicle users**, and in particular for people living outside the higher density part of the town. They discourage people venturing into town on foot or by bicycle, and discourage those living inside from venturing further out by foot or bike etc. for walking recreation, dog walking, cycling, or to visit Dromkeen, Riddells Creek Nursery of the childcare centre etc. Dealing with squeeze points will do a lot to improve walkability in Riddells Creek.

Squeeze points need to rectified *before* improvement of the rest of routes into and out of Riddell. For example, improving the shared path along the existing wide and grassy verges on roads will add little value if a person on that route encounters a squeeze spot like that at the Sandy Creek/Dry Creek bridge on the Kilmore Road. Three of the four squeeze spots are created by road bridges over creeks, that can be rectified by the construction of separate pedestrian/shared footbridges. The exception is the bluestone rail bridge which poses a particularly challenging problem, especially if the Woodend to Riddells Creek Shared Path project is completed to the South of the railway line, alongside Markham Rd (which is one of its two alternate routes currently shown on the project's plans).


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



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# Walkability north of Main Road

No marked footpath up Gap Road - cars can travel down that stretch with speed and bends in the road make it difficult to see people walking on the road,, plus walkers may not see the cars coming in either direction. Plus some walkers walk on the wrong side of the road. It is important that walkers have safe access to Barrm Birrm and Royal Parade, plus it will encourage more people to go to this amazing asset. Solution: a gravel path on one side of Gap Road which is maintained, clearly signed and wide enough to take both bicycles and walkers.

South down Gap Rd, turn right into Main Rd and walk down to the shops/supermarket. No footpath on Gap Rd - we need a footpath.

> Bolithos road to Royal Parade. Very dangerous as uneven terrain. Grade the surface or bitumen road

The walking route up Melvin's, along Royal Parade and down Gap (or vice versa) is very popular. There is no pedestrian walking path along Gap Road and Melvins road and Gap Road in particular can be quite unsafe as the speed limit is high. Also there are blind spots. Pedestrian path added on Gap Road from Main Road to Royal Parade at a minimum.would ensure safety for all pedestrians. .

Erect recommended speed (20km/hr) signs where there are no footpaths, e.g. Melvins Rd, Merrifield St, Bolithos Rd, Gap Rd, Edward St and Sandy Creek Rd.

I would like to see Murnong Creek starting around Whittaker's Lane better utilized, with a walking track alongside it and cleared of weeds.

Or widen the road to share more easily...

I walk Gap Road a lot, which gets a lot of foot traffic. A footpath all the way up to Royal Parade would make a huge difference by getting pedestrians off busy Gap Road.

Main Road/Gap Road to Royal Parade/Gap.. There is no formed formal pathway, and many people walk on the sealed part of Gap Road, which is narrow and not wide enough for two vehicles and pedestrians. Even with one car, it is dangerous when cars traveling on Gap Road have to pass pedestrians. The section from the crest of the hill around 173 Gap Road is particularly dangerous, since walkers and cars cannot see each other ahead of when they pass. The solution is a formed track, gravel, on the verge. There is already a goat track uphill of Whittakers Lane, but it is narrow and only wide enough for one person. Existing track is narrow and carries water when it rains. With a gravel track wide enough for two people and a dog, which is a typical pedestrian configuration, people would get off the road and walk here.

Gap Road up to Barrm Birrm. Better walking path north of Whittakers Lane up to the corner of Gap Rd and Royal Parade. There is an informal track along the fence line (western side) which is great, but only goes part way and could be widened to make it more accessible (I do like how it is off the edge of the road)





# Walkability Gisborne end of town

Melvins Rd, through Wybejong Reserve, under the Kilmore Rd bridge, through the Lion's Park, along Station St. This route not usable in wet weather. Need a marked and maintained trail path through Wybejong Reserve; easier access to the stairs from this path to prevent slipping in wet weather (in other words, extend the stairs upwards to LEVEL ground rather than sloped so young children don't need to hold hands that even adults often can't spare); create a HIDDEN GEM by painting the area under the Kilmore Rd into an Australian Native themed mural rather than the ugly graffiti and bare concrete that is currently visible; improve the "stairs" leading to the lake in the Lion's Park (young children need to hold hands again), loose gravel is NOT ideal; create an extension to the path from Wybejong Reserve to go around behind the kindergarten and Neighbourhood House to Station St. Currently, NONE of this walk is viable in wet weather AT ALL - which is a good 5 or 6 months of the year. Earlier this year, I was diagnosed with TWO TORN TENDONS in my right ankle that will take two or three years to heal. I can't use this route at all now even in clear weather, yet it always felt safer to me than my Kilmore Road route, as it was the only "clean" and healthy way I could avoid crossing Kilmore Rd.

Juine Vers -

I have occasionally walked to the nursery, and which I would do so more frequently, but crossing the road bridge feels quite dangerous. A walking path with its own pedestrian bridge over the creek is essential for pedestrian safety. There has been a substantial increase in traffic over the bridge over the 35 years we have lived in Riddells Creek.

The bridge is too narrow to allow vehicles and pedestrians to use the bridge at the same time. The speed restriction to 70 km/hr increases the risk for pedestrians. Dedicated foot (and bicycle) bridges would allow safe movement over the creek.

Carre Riddell bridge is to dangerous to walk across. Needs a pedestrian/cycle/horse bridge (same with Sandy/Dry Creek at other end of town).





The Redacted due to Privacy Reasons ) welcomes the opportunity to provide the following submission on Macedon Ranges Shire Council's 2024/25 Budget. The submission is proposal for funding three projects:

- 1. Gardens for Wildlife
- 2. Urban Biodiversity Officer
- 3. Urban Forest Strategy

These three proposals are closely related and interconnected as they are focused on enhancing the environmental and amenity values of the shire's urban areas, in its towns and villages.

#### 1. Gardens for Wildlife

#### 2024-25 Budget - \$41K for Gardens for Wildlife Program

<u>Background:</u> Gardens for Wildlife Victoria is a state-wide network of local government and community group partnerships, which supports collaboration, connections and the establishment of new Gardens for Wildlife programs. There are currently Gardens for Wildlife programs in more than 25 municipalities across Victoria.

In Macedon Ranges Shire volunteers from groups such as Redacted due to Privacy Reasons have for several years been promoting the Gardens for Wildlife program. Up until now support for Gardens for Wildlife is being done by volunteers. However, it's time for Macedon Ranges Shire Council to support a Gardens for Wildlife program with a dedicated staff resource to develop, promote and implement the program, and other resources to encourage urban residents to create gardens using indigenous plants that create habitat and food sources for wildlife.

The Council funding to be provided in 2024-25 for the Shire Council's Gardens for Wildlife program will build on the work done by volunteers to promote Gardens for Wildlife, by Council providing resources to expand the reach of the program, including promotional and educational resources for residents in the Shire, garden assessments and advice on plantings, and the provision of 10,000 free indigenous seedlings annually to be planted in urban gardens in the Shire.

Council support for Gardens for Wildlife will implement an action in Biodiversity Strategy (2018) - Action 2.32: Support residents to preserve and plant locally native vegetation as much as possible and consider implementing an urban biodiversity program such as "Gardens for Wildlife".

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The Biodiversity Strategy notes that "Council and the community recognise the environmental and amenity value of native vegetation and habitat within town boundaries. Our township areas have high value natural areas that are home to rich diversity of native plants and animals. They also provide important opportunities for residents to connect with nature close to home...Encouraging residents to create wildlife-friendly gardens can also have a huge impact on local biodiversity. The use of locally native plants in gardens and public open space areas, including as a part of new subdivisions can create havens for insects, lizards, butterflies, birds and arboreal mammals. Native plants are also ideal as they are naturally adapted to suit local environmental conditions, low maintenance, drought tolerant, require minimal water and no fertilisers or pesticides." (page 95)

Funding this project will contribute to Council's 'Healthy environment, healthy people' theme in Council's 2021-2031.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council already has great series of booklets on flora and fauna that will be invaluable in supporting the delivery of a Gardens for Wildlife program in the Shire.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Gardens for Wildlife program:

- will encourage urban residents to create gardens using indigenous plants that create habitat and food sources for wildlife,
- garden assessments will include advice about the benefits of planting climate-ready native vegetation by selecting species and provenances to extend genetic diversity and match future climatic conditions,
- the 10,000 free indigenous plants to be planted in urban areas each year will be to local areas
  and climate-resilient, provide habitat and help mitigate the impact of climate change, and
  help create urban forest areas in Mitchell Shire,

#### 2. Urban Biodiversity Officer

2024-25 Budget - \$90K (including Super + on-costs)

P/T FTE 0.6, on-going from 2024-25: Band 6 annual salary = \$91K to \$99K + 11.5% Super + on-costs (pro rata for FTE 0.6 per week)

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has a Biodiversity Officer who works FTE 0.8, but who is spread thinly in this role. The provision of funding for the Urban Biodiversity Officer position is imperative for the delivery of Council's Gardens for Wildlife program.

The Urban Biodiversity Officer would also deliver a wide range of other urban biodiversity-related tasks required for Council. This new role would enable Council's Biodiversity Officer to focus more strategically on biodiversity in rural areas and public land and implementation of Council's Biodiversity Strategy.

# 3. Urban Forest Strategy

2024-25 Budget - \$80K to hire consultant to develop strategy

Macedon Ranges Shire Council needs an Urban Forest Strategy to guide Council's strategic direction on enhancing and protecting trees and vegetation in its towns and villages. The strategy will set the strategic direction on how to protect, enhance and manage the shire's urban forest over the next 10, 20 and 50 years.

The strategy will help improve canopy cover and greening within towns and villages. The strategy will cover all trees and shrubs within towns and villages on both public and private land.

The Shire's urban areas face many challenges including:

- Climate Change harsher conditions for trees to establish, survive and thrive.
- Urban Subdivision loss of canopy due to housing subdivisions in urban areas across the shire.
- Community Perception a negative perception of trees from a risk, litter, or infrastructure damage perspective.
- Emergency Management bushfires, floods and storms have already caused significant impacts to some of our communities in our very recent past, and the financial and health and wellbeing strain can be overwhelming. Damage from these events can be exacerbated by trees or branches.
- Funding and Resources finite funding makes increasing tree planting and other opportunities difficult, especially when competing with other services.

The Urban Forest Strategy will mitigate the above challenges by setting clear objectives, actions, and targets to be delivered over 10, 20 and 50 years. A key focus of the strategy should be to increase canopy coverage within road reserves and parks and identify opportunities to improve tree retention and protection on private land in urban areas.

The Strategy will need to include an Action Plan and priorities for each township and village based on short (1-3 years), medium (4-6 years) and long term (beyond 7-10 years) timeframes as well as

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ongoing actions. The Action Plan will be reviewed every three years. This review will include evaluation of the progress, targets, and indicators in the strategy.

The strategy will assist in directing council resources to locations of highest priority. Budgets will need to be prepared for each of the short, medium, long and ongoing actions aligning to timeframe years of delivery. This will include both capital and operational funding avenues as appropriate.

Supports the Council commitment to reaching a Zero Net Emissions status for its operations by 2030 & specifically by -

- "Getting off gas" at Council-owned buildings.
- Increasing generation and supply of power through installing solar panels and battery power storage at Council-owned buildings,
- Exploring options for creating offsets that provide co-benefits for local communities, economies, and biodiversity.

As the hall is currently gas (bottled) heated & uncooled, easy to use heating & cooling will increase the use of the hall in winter and on extremely hot days, which increases social cohesiveness in the community especially benefitting the relatively large number of new arrivals, increases hall revenue, draws in more tourists and revenue for local retail businesses, service provides, entertainers, caterers etc.

Assist the development of more community groups who would have access to all year-round premises.

Draw more larger functions to the Hall e.g., weddings, family occasions etc. and more independent operators such as music and artistic groups.

# Summary of elements of the proposal

# **Heating & Cooling**

Outside of a small split system in the dining room, the Malmsbury Hall is heated by an old **gas** (bottled) heating system which is environmentally a disaster as it is a fossil fuel and against Council policy. It is extremely expensive to run & chews through gas bottles. There is no cooling which means that it is quite intolerable in heat waves, more of which are expected in the forthcoming El Nino and with worsening climate change.

Proposal envisages installing 4 split system units in the main hall – outside pump components would be relatively unintrusive & protected from vandalism.

# Electricity generation & storage

#### Install inobtrusive solar panels and a battery at the hall.

- Install 30 KW unobtrusive solar panels (72) generating 37,643 KWH per annum.
- Converter equipment (2 X 12.5)
- Battery with storage capacity 14 KWH

- Supporting the Council's Zero Net Emissions policy, reducing or eliminating electrical costs and perhaps even gaining net revenue.

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

# 2. Why work with sports?

Sport and Active recreation create opportunities for people to be healthy through physical activity and emotionally and socially connected to other members of their community. Sport and recreation is worth billions of dollars in health, mental health and wellbeing prevention costs, social connection and volunteering time to AUS every year.

We know that physically and mentally healthy people who are socially connected do better in times of emergency particularly if they know who to call and where to go.

We know that people are less resistant to environmental messaging if it is delivered through their sports team.

We know that Australian Sports and major events are looking to improve their environmental credentials and maintain their social license to operate.

National Sporting Organisations and State Sporting Organisations have social impact plans for reconciliation, EDI, Culture and now increasingly Environmental Sustainability. Their work endeavours to influence what is happening in community sport. In Victoria this is supported regionally by a collective of Regional Sports Assemblies and by regional area managers who work for specific sports.

Sports in Australia who are most advanced in the environmental sustainability this space are signatories to the UN Sports For Climate Action Framework. The framework is aligned to the SDGs and wellbeing economy principles. Sports are working on emissions reductions, waste and pollution reduction, nature protection, repair, and connectivity. There may be opportunities to incubate or test ideas with them for mutual benefit.

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There are also a growing number of advocacy groups representing athlete voice including Footy for Climate, Cricket for Climate, Surfers for Climate and Front Runner Athletes.

We know that the climate disruptions we face can decimate participation, particularly of more vulnerable groups.

Here is an example of what this would look like for Tennis.

With increasing temperatures daytime participation will decrease and under lights play will increase in the cooler times of day.

Night play increases light pollution and decreases acees of more vulnerable groups.

If daytime play is cancelled due to heat policies created by Tennis Australia or Tennis Victoria groups who miss out might include—morning sessions for cardio tennis for mums with bubs in tow, early afternoon for older social players, afterschool kids lessons and tournaments, PWD play during the day (it is unlikely carers can take PWD to sessions in the evening). It is women with families, young people and vulnerable people due to age or underlying health conditions who will miss out. Those with financial means, ability to participate without home or work responsibilities and are healthy adults will have more access than other groups.

Bushfire smoke has similar repercussions- even if there is not a fire here.

If facilities are damaged there are similar repercussions.

Sport does not occur nor does active mobility in extreme conditions or when there is loss or damage to infrastructure.

When there are cancellations or delays and increasing insurance premiums community clubs experience loss of revenue (this goes up the chain to associations, and governing bodies at local, state and national level). Some may not be financially viable anymore or need to increase participation fees and general costs of food and beverage and uniform (again impacting some community members ability to afford participation). Loss of continuity in participation means people drop out and we have seen this throughout COVID - post COVID we saw a drop in volunteering return and in return of youth and vulnerable people to sport.

Increasing fuel costs and fuel poverty, all linked to cost-of-living crisis has a flow on effect – if a family can't afford petrol and there are not safe active mobility, public transport or lift share options to attend, they can't participate, they lose access to physical ability, mental health benefits and social connection.

Climate disruption can decimate participation, particularly of more vulnerable groups. Less participation decreases the health and wellbeing of communities and the viability of community organisations relying on local business sponsorship, membership fees and volunteers, organisations like sports clubs.

The shires climate emergency plan indicates sport is an area to work in:

Sustainable sports 1.1 Promote and support actions for sustainability amongst sports clubs in the shire (eg, plastic-free canteens, textile and equipment reuse and recycling, entrance to the renewable energy market, water literacy).

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There are many opportunities to reduce sports impacts through funding available from state and federal government to support changing lighting and energy sources, change over hot water appliances etc.

The Victorian strategic framework for sport and active recreation - <u>Active Victoria 2022-2026</u> highlights the importance of supporting regional communities to maintain access to sport and physical activity and the risks presented by climate change to regional and remote communities.

Working with sport can support the MRSC climate emergency plan, biodiversity plan and other actions that reduce our impact on the environment, provide adaptations to changed and rapidly changing climate and support the creation of healthy and resilient communities within a wellness, distributive, and regenerative model.

Sport is recognised as being a facilitator of social impact that changes and normalises behaviours. It has a national following across codes. There may be potential for the shire to provide consultative feebased support to other council wishing to set up or adapt a like approach.

We do not have to re-invent the wheel there are multiple activations that we can use to help develop a shire wide approach. Here are some examples that contain a wide range of activations:

- Planet League
- Save Today Play Tomorrow
- Sustainable Sport Program
- Pledgeball
- Green Sports Day

With a well-being approach there may also be opportunities to connect with VicHealth and a collection of other organisations to develop an incubator project.

The first step is however to generate a baseline to see the extent of the problem and the most impactful place to start.

Sport is not an innocent bystander and impacts climate change, pollution and biodiversity loss.

Sporting Club Environmental Impact and Resilience Audit of clubs across the shire to establish baseline data.

#### 4.1. Understanding and Literacy

- 4.1.1.Does the sports community (focus on committee members) understand the impacts of climate change on their sport, have they already been impacted by climate change, do they know how to make a difference at their club?
  - 4.1.1.1. Can we increase understanding of the impacts of climate change on sport in the shire and support activation to take action at a local level. Offer sports specific carbon literacy across the shire and possibly connect across shires in Loddon Mallee. Possible courses include <u>AimHi Earth</u>, <u>Carbon Literacy Project Sports Kit</u> (currently under creation as an Australian version) or customising <u>Amble Studios: The Adaptation Game</u>. Seek funding from the Australian Sports Commission, Sustainability Victoria or Sport and Recreation Victoria via ministerial discussions.

#### 4.2. Reach

4.2.1. How many sports clubs are there, what codes are played, where are they located – mapped to schools, biodiversity corridors and active mobility corridors. How many people play sport in the shire, what are the intergenerational demographics, do people play where they live or travel to other towns, what influences this? Who and how many people will be influenced by activations in this space are there some hard to reach groups?

#### 4.3. Impact

- 4.3.1. How much and what types of energy and water are used, where is it sourced from, what is the appetite for changed energy provision
  - 4.3.1.1. Can we reduce energy and water use, change energy providers (via VECCO or tenancy agreements), reduce costs to clubs and council, support just transition through design, contribute to community resilience by increasing access to facilities in down time and climate disruption? Do we need to improve water and energy literacy?
  - 4.3.1.2. Can sports clubs be home to energy resilience and be the centres for emergency. Can we use these facilities and have multiple tenancies and booking systems? Can we value the infrastructure of sprots clubs to increase civi engagement through multiple tenancies that cross over and develop better tenancy agreements?
- 4.3.2. How are uniforms and equipment procured and turned over, does it provide revenue to clubs, are there 'giveaways' from the club, league, association, state or national body

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- 4.3.2.1. Can we reduce textile waste, link into shire textile waste recycling projects, can we reduce equipment waste, can we influence the giveaway culture, can we reduce costs to the club and participants through design, fact sheet for clubs.
- 4.3.3. How much travel takes place in the home and away season for training and fixtures, are facilities connected to active mobility corridors, is travel to and from considered safe and accessible, is there infrastructure, bike racks and water stations and share vehicle culture available or is it understood
  - 4.3.3.1. Can we create active mobility corridors that support active transport to training, home fixtures and events at the clubs. Can we introduce a lift share app or encourage lift sharing for away fixtures?
  - 4.3.3.2. Can we map where and how a whole community from a club wants to travel and create a pop-up intervention to ride, walk and lift share to and from home fixtures and training?
  - 4.3.3.3. I have estimated that for 2 children, 2 sports, 4 terms that I drive well over 3,200 kms a year (minimum).
- 4.3.4.Food and beverage service Does the club have kitchen, food and beverage facilities, Packaging and food waste audit, canteen or food truck services volunteer or paid, is there hydration refill options, what do users think of the canteen choices provided, does the club utilise the 4 bin system, are venues left in good condition after training and match day?
  - 4.3.4.1. Can we find ways to introduce Plastic free hydration and canteens and connect with other climate action planning?
- 4.4. Biodiversity where are clubs located and what is the opportunity, they present in terms of connecting biodiversity corridors or undertaking minimal landscaping to support local biodiversity. What are the clubs mascots and can they engage in <u>#WorldWithoutNature Day</u> an initiative of the WWF.
  - 4.4.1.Can we support public golf courses to undertake rewilding like Woodend Golf Course, can we engage families in small scale landscaping and planting days at local venues (gardens out the front, nesting boxes on key trees, etc.) A summary of the work done on course has been attached to this submission.
  - 4.4.2. Can we support clubs to participate in world without nature day
  - 4.4.3.Some examples of sport and collective work include the World Surf League, Cricket Australia
- 4.5. Communications is there any form of communication at the club relating to litter, hydration or food choices, energy or water use, active mobility to the club, protecting nature
  - 4.5.1.Can signage and bin influencing be introduced, can children from the club's design signage, bin influencer stickers, ground signage, canteen signage?

Solutions can encourage some competitiveness tangible, fun and playful – something you can see, feel, do that has a lasting legacy...examples are included above and may also include

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- Run educations session on site or publish a series of articles in the local magazines like the
  Woodend star about how to be a green sport or environment newsletter (we could even start a
  sports newsletter for environment AND other things!)
- Signage blank space for education and messaging on all the footy field signs so much council advertising space for activations that sports clubs can do, at least get people to put their rubbish in the bin this could be expanded to respect, reconciliation, equity and inclusion signage it would look great!
- Run plogging events preseason and with runner groups or emu bobs!
- Cycle Macedon ranges and plant trees- link to strava app and get out of shire people to commit to a safer climate future to protect the places they love to cycle here
- Goggle and cap collection at swim centres for reuse and recycling
- Plastic Freen Canteens change the way we do hydration and coffee + HEALTH my kids only get unhealthy food at canteens. Have a fact sheet and also get all canteen managers and coffee truck people together to talk about it
- Bin Influencers create stickers for at sports clubs and provide some email communications and possible do a couple of videos of local sports people doing the right thing
- Wear green arm bands and back story of interconnection between sport and nature and our shared responsibility as a TEAM to protect our one planet.

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# Re-wilding Woodend

Kate Torgersen looks at the project to re-wild Woodend Golf Club northwest of Melbourne and the positive impact it will have on flora and fauna as well as the local community.

nnabel Sides is a resident in the Macedon Ranges north west of Melbourne who has a passion for future-proofing sport. During one of Victoria's many COVID-enforced lockdowns, Sides approached me to say the local council had a grant opportunity that would be perfect for golf courses within that shire. I knew straight away this could be a fantastic opportunity to showcase the key environmental benefits of golf.

Sides is founder of Green Planet Sport, a regenerative sport consultancy business that offers advice to create a clear path to climate action through the development of bespoke purpose projects, grant finding and grantapplication writing. A childhood spent farming and a lifetime in sport has been the foundation

for Sides to establish the company. Her aim is for sport to be involved in tackling climate change and to build a better future for sport, children and the planet.

We have all witnessed the impact of the ongoing global pandemic on community sport. Throughout long lockdowns, the effects on the physical and mental health of golf club members and the wider community, in particular young people, has been significant.

It is hard to believe that as sport meets the challenge to 'build back better' post pandemic, that it is not the pandemic that will be the biggest challenge sport will face this decade. The biggest challenge will be climate change and the associated complexity of disruptions within our natural, social and economic ecosystems.

Adapting now to the challenges that courses and clubs will face ensures a future where they can continue to deliver play and manage the disruptions with less impact on financial security of the club, jobs, nature and the health and wellbeing of club members and the wider community.

This article aims to focus in on one action – re-wilding – that brings health to and fosters resilience in the land, waterways, wildlife and people that call their golf course home. If the world's golf courses focus some time on land use, then that's a positive for the planet.

### THE STORY SO FAR

Woodend Golf Club in the Macedon Ranges is taking up the challenge to future proof its course by embarking on a series of

activities to become more sustainable. In 2020 the Macedon Ranges Shire Council and consultants created the Woodend Region Climate Change Action Plan - Cool Changes 3442.

When the shire's community funding scheme was announced for 2020, Sides saw an opportunity for sports clubs to apply within the environment stream to pilot the region's first Green Sport Action plan. As a member of Woodend Golf Club, Sides contacted secretary Barney Hearnden, which led to the creation of a collaborative grant application titled, Future Proofing Woodend Golf Club: A Green Sports Action. The application was successful.

The club subsequently engaged Environmental Golf Solutions to create an environment master plan (EMP). Sides provided in-kind support for action planning, member surveys, partnership development and future proofing sport planning.

On paper this sounds formal, complex and somewhat overwhelming. In reality, the consultants take the complex elements away. They create the maps, the plans, the plant lists and the activity ideas for greatest impact. This leaves the golf community to focus on the project's bones that make long-term success possible: the partnership, collaboration and community building, the ideas sharing and learning, and the connections. Re-wilding is all about people looking after their place and all creatures great and small that call it home.

The project is now at the point where the course play zones (out-of-play, recovery and play) have been identified. Regeneration and protection zones have been earmarked and first-year pilot sites allocated and plants ordered. A mow and no-mow map is in design while nesting box type, number and locations are nearly finalised.

Plots for Year 1 include the raised and tufted grassland to protect an out-of-play zone from ball entry, a pollinator plot, a weed-control region abutting grassland due for regeneration in Year 2 and several remnant grassland protection and enhancement sites.

Woodend course superintendent Grant Davies is one of the key players in the project to re-wild the course and its surrounds. Davies says the approach is to keep a balance of native vegetation and exotics. The course has a fairly even split between the two through the front of the course and to the back where most of the remnant vegetation and re-wilding opportunities lie.

Davies has a keen eye for species identification and his love of the golf course, the game and the environment will continue to see the project thrive under his leadership, supported by an army of passionate Woodend volunteers.

"Our revegetation project gives the club a chance to give back to the course that we play and love," Davies says. "With Kate's guidance and the engagement of local community and environmental groups, we will over time see significant cost and time savings with less time spent mowing rough and out-of-play areas. The environment will benefit from the native plantings and the increase in biodiversity. And

the course will become an even more beautiful place to be."

Club secretary Hearnden adds: "During pandemic restrictions, over 80 per cent of our members surveyed missed the social interaction that being part of the club provides. This project offers another way for members and the wider community to be involved at the club.

# **COMMUNITY SUPPORT**

While club members are getting behind the project, so too is the local community. To date there have been many 'walks' of the golf course to get the re-wilding project to its present point. The latest community gathering showed what the maps and plans mean, allowing a joint vision for the scope of

possibility in future years. Club members and staff joined with community representatives from Landcare, Council, Woodend Bee Friendly Society and consultants to identify plants and share information and new ideas.

When asked about what the re-wilding project means to Woodend, representatives were in agreement the project would provide significant benefits for local flora and fauna as well as the Woodend community.

"This project is a great opportunity for two community organisations to collaborate on connecting the natural environment unique to our township," says Peter Yates of Woodend Landcare. "We are working on an environment master plan for the Five Mile Creek precinct that adjoins the golf club. We supported each other's application to the MRSC

community-funding scheme and together we are identifying walking paths to connect the spaces and collaborating on plant identification and revegetation management techniques.

"In years to come the golf course's re-wilded areas will be a great resource for Woodend Landcare to be able to show what is possible and upskill our members together with the club volunteers to identify local wildlife species and learn about revegetation management techniques."

William Terry from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council believes such a project as the one being undertaken at Woodend could be done on golf courses across Australia and has been impressed with the level of community engagement it has generated.

"I am blown away by the opportunity for enhancing habitat at Woodend Golf Course," says Terry. "The course re-wilding will support such a variety of wildlife. As nesting boxes are introduced, remnant vegetation is enhanced, weeds are controlled and plots of revegetation are put in place, we should see a resurgence in native species. It is exciting to think that the club may be home now and in the future to near threatened or threatened species."

Ross Brierty from Woodend Bee Friendly Society has applauded the club for the creation of a bespoke pollinator plot on course and says Australian golf courses should consider investing in such work.

"Woodend's approach is almost an extension of our community work to support bees in the local environment," says Brierty. "Offering support on location, plantings and pitfalls of chemical use that can impact both native and introduced bees, along with hive type and location, helps everyone in the community appreciate the importance of bees and how to protect them as an integral part of our food web."

transform a greenfield site into a pollinator haven," Dr Hall says. "It will also feed into the hive of pollinator activity and research being undertaken by the Upper Campaspe Landcare Network. The initiative of this sports club to be part of supporting wildlife shows their connection to their community and an understanding of new methods of course

stewardship. These types of changes are critical to support healthy local pollinators."

"I am new to Woodend and the game of golf," explains Fredriksen. "I have loved seeing the wildlife on course, in particular the birdlife, and the recent course walks have opened my eyes to so many plants I had never seen before. Golf is such a great way to connect to our natural world."

# RE-WILDING 101 - GETTING THE PROCESS STARTED

nnabel Sides and Kate Torgersen provide some useful tips and advice for golf clubs looking at re-wilding their golf course.

- Allocate time, money and resources to re-wilding your club. This could be through applying for a grant, having a fundraiser or setting up a 'green golfer' membership.
- Explore skills with your club to create an environment master plan (EMP) or seek expert advice from a specialist environmental consultant.
- Find out who are the traditional owners of the land on which your club sits and seek to engage with them. Welcome them on course and into your club to be part of the planning process to share local wildlife knowledge, land and waterway management techniques, as well as to identify local significance of the region.
- Ensure your EMP encompasses plant identification and pilot areas, longerterm plans, water, fertiliser and chemical management, seed banking and weed control, seasonal-mow schedules, plus zone identification (riparian, grassland, forest, remnant, revegetation or buffering).
- Identify out-of-play, recovery and play zones and what these mean and why the club has chosen them as part of the environment master plan.
- Investigate being part of a university study for habitat.
- Provide club members and visitors with a bird guide and map as part of their cart hire. Get them involved in local bird count blitzes by encouraging them to download an app and be part of the annual Australian bird count and frog ID program.



- Talk to the local water-catchment authority and see if there are ways to collaborate with them to manage water quality and revegetate and manage riparian zones.
- See if you can work with local tree project volunteers to propagate or provide seed (especially if your course is located in an urban area).



- Talk to a local Landcare to support seed banking for future regeneration projects.
- Use the club platform to write about your efforts to support wildlife.
- Contact local schools to see if they're interested in a nature and junior golfer program.
- Offer local community engagement at the club through walking tracks, outside of tee times.
- Leave what falls on country on country and resist the temptation to clean up outof-play areas.
- Allow spaces to green, such as car park areas, rooftops and those out-of-bounds areas that can all contribute to habitat.
- Promote re-wilding practices through social media and broader media channels to connect people to your project.
- Utilise signage to showcase the regeneration areas.
- Join a community of practice such as Environmental Golf Solutions, which hosts Zoom chat sessions where people can ask questions and listen to case study examples.
- Know that when seeking funds, there are opportunities outside of normal sports grants. A conversation with Annabel Sides from Green Planet Sport can help generate ideas around what might be available.
- Take drone footage and pictures to compare your course in future years.
- Commence re-wilding in small out-of-play zones or areas that already have native vegetation.
- Look to include threatened or nearthreatened endemic species in your plantings.
- Start today.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on MRSC's Draft 2024-2025 Budget.

In the context of its Statement of Purpose 2, "To advocate to stakeholders and seek opportunity and initiatives to promote eastern corridor economic development and the local visitor economy", has prioritised the following for consideration of budget allocation;

1. Specialist Horticulture Maintenance Services for Botanic and High Profile Gardens The Macedon Ranges visitor economy is incredibly important to the region. The demand for experiences in nature includes those in the region's Botanic Gardens and similar open space destinations such as Romsey Ecotherapy Park. As well as an important community resource, Romsey Ecotherapy Park is a vital visitor attraction in the eastern corridor, having earlier this year been awarded Parks Leisure Australia's Park of the Year Award (Victoria and Tasmania). High profile and, in the case of Romsey Ecotherapy Park, complex gardens require specialist maintenance compared to the Shire's more regular parks and open spaces. Failure to adequately maintain these spaces will most definitely result in their deterioration with a subsequent loss of reputational integrity for them as both visitor-worthy assets and outstanding community resources. In the case of the multi-million dollar Romsey Ecotherapy Park, Council's financial investment was significant which is another reason to prioritise its specialist maintenance. Complex plantings, art installations, water features and other infrastructure elements dictate a higher level of maintenance is required. Failure to do so will seriously risk the ongoing reputation of this and other specialised gardens/parks which are important to the Macedon Ranges visitor economy.

# 2. Visitor Signage Romsey Ecotherapy Park

Currently, there is only finger blade signage in the immediate vicinity of the Romsey Ecotherapy Park. The Park itself is to some extent obscured from the Main Road. Given the visitor/tourism credentials of this eastern corridor asset, requests budgetary consideration for formal tourism signage - either "Gateway" or "Advance" signage (as per Vic Roads Tourist Signing Guidelines). This will support both planned and spontaneous awareness of this attraction by visitors to the region.

3. Romsey Five Mile Creek Master Plan Implementation (Stage 2)

The development of the Five Mile Creek Master Plan in 2019 and its anticipated implementation was welcomed by Redacted due to Privacy Reasons at the time as a wonderful synergy project to the Romsey Ecotherapy Park. The prospect of a "precinct" of well planned

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open space was exciting from both a visitor asset and local community amenity perspective as well as its potential knock-on economic importance and utilisation cannot be underestimated. Despite the original Implementation Plan scheduling Stage 2 for completion in 2022-2023, this has not occurred or, apparently, been funded. The Draft Romsey Structure Plan's Strategy 12 action is to "Continue to implement the Five Mile Creek Master plan". The importance of steadily implementing the Five Mile Creek Master Plan cannot be underestimated in both an environmental amenity context and the knock-on visitor economy sense. Prequests Council seriously consider funding allocation to Stage 2, costed in October 2022 at \$ 365,160. This would include expanding the path network along the south side of the Creek to create a loop walk and tree planting for shade and habitat. It also includes improvements to Wrixon Street entry including path connections, bridge crossing, frontage fencing and signage.

In addition to the visitor asset benefit, the project will have excellent health and wellbeing outcomes for the Romsey community as well as providing much better connectivity allowing active transport in the township.

# **Summary Statement**

seriously committed to ongoing advocacy for economic development, the visitor economy and community amenity in the eastern Macedon Ranges which, in turn, benefits the Shire more generally. The limited amount of visitor economy product in the eastern corridor desperately needs nurturing. implores Council to seriously consider the above items for consideration in the 2024-2025 Budget.

We are grateful to have this opportunity to comment on MRSC's Draft 2024-2025 Budget.

# > Specialist Horticultural Maintenance Position for Botanic and High Profile Gardens

We are committed to advocating for the ongoing maintenance of Romsey Ecotherapy Park to the standard this complex and important community and tourism resource requires and deserves. Part of the funding argument to allow construction of this Park was its value as a visitor economy asset and health and wellbeing resource in the eastern corridor of the Macedon Ranges. For these benefits of the Park to be ongoing, specialist horticultural maintenance services are required compared to more regular reserves and parks. Failure to adequately maintain the Park's special spaces and infrastructure will most definitely result in their deterioration with a subsequent loss of reputational integrity for them as both visitor-worthy assets and outstanding community resources. This sort of specialised horticulture maintenance position would also apply to other feature gardens and parks in the region such as Botanic gardens.

Council, State Government and Federal Government all made significant investment into Romsey Ecotherapy Park which was the Victorian/Tasmanian Park of the Year on 2023 (Parks Leisure Australia). As a high profile regional asset, it is imperative that its reputation and that of its investors is maintained.

# > Tourism Signage for Romsey Ecotherapy Park

Given its visitor credentials, Romsey Ecotherapy Park would benefit from installation of Regional Roads Victoria tourism. Unless people are familiar with the Park, the current finger blade signage is inadequate for those planning visits to the Park and those who could discover it incidentally as they travel through the region.

# > Romsey Five Mile Creek Master Plan Implementation (Stage 2)

The development of the Five Mile Creek Master Plan in 2019 and its anticipated implementation was welcomed by as a wonderful synergy project to the Romsey Ecotherapy Park. In an era where the link between wellness and experiences in nature is in people's consciousness more than

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ever, the prospect of a "precinct" of well planned open space was exciting from both a visitor and local community asset perspective

Our understanding is that Stage 2 implementation was originally scheduled for 2022-2023 but was not funded. We do hope budgetary consideration can be given for this to occur in 2024-2025.

The **Redacted due to Privacy Reasons** a sub group that focuses on all aspects of sustainable transport within the Macedon Ranges. This includes advocating for improved infrastructure for active transport, improved public transport and support for other transport projects such as electric vehicles and e-mobility, which help to support our overall vision of creating and nurturing environmental, social, and economic sustainability throughout the Macedon Ranges Shire.

To do this we educate and assist our community to adopt lifestyle changes and engage in projects and activities designed to:

- Reduce our carbon footprint by encouraging walking and cycling, e-mobility and the use of public transport
- Reduce our dependency on cars which in turn helps people financially
- Educate people on the social and health benefits of active transport which create connection, encourage physical activity and allow people to experience their environment from a different perspective.

These activities directly support the themes under the Council's vision as outlined below:

- Connecting communities: A connected community is where people have access to the services they need and are empowered to contribute, creating a sense of belonging.
- Healthy environment, healthy people: The community prioritises the protection of the natural environment and recreational facilities.

- Support two more sustainable travel events across the Shire.




I wish to make the following statements with regards to the MRSC Domestic Animal Management Plan.

I am a resident of Mount Macedon . One is ue that continues to be of concern is wandering cats at night despite the cat curfew and dogs off leads, despite the Domestic Animal Management Plan requiring dogs to be on-leads.

# Wandering cats

Where I live on Mount Macedon, I regularly see and hear cats wandering during the night and during the day time. I regularly hear cat bells under my bedroom window at 4.00am. Constantly and sometimes daily has pictures of cats wandering through her garden captured on CC TV cameras. Other residents also report seeing cats in their garden at night, this is across many locations on Mount Macedon. Mount Macedon is a Rural Conservation Zone, and miraculously still has wild life and birds living here. Wandering cats put our very vulnerable birds and small mammals at very high risk of being killed. Recently I visited a friends place, only to be told that the neighbours cat had just killed a pardalote, in the day time.





given to me. I made it very clear to his former owners that he would not be allowed outside unsupervised. This was years before the curfew came in. If allowed outside on his own, he would have been a machine in the sensitive environment I live in. What is a his way of life, this is what I call Responsible Pet ownership.

# Dogs on/off leads

It is pleasing to see many residents being responsible and walking their dogs on leads. and also utilising the dog off lead areas. However, this does not always happen. Just a week ago and all on one day, I witnessed locals walking their dog off lead just outside my front gate on Mount Macedon, at the Macedon Supermarket, a dog owner walking his dog, off lead. On Honour Avenue, a dog being walked with an owner, off lead. At Centennial Park, a small fluffy dog off lead came racing up to me with his owner quite some distance away. On Douglas Road, a small curly haired dog seen regularly running down the road, an escapee. Today, a local resident reported to me the following, a dog came into her garden and was nudging her in her back, this was a large dog. This

She did not know who the dog belonged to or where the dog came from. She saw this dog again in her garden the following day and on a number of occasions and in a neighbouring garden racing around a chook shed driving the chooks into a state of panic. Additionally, another resident is seen regularly walking his two dogs around Mount Macedon and across the road in Stanley Park, a Conservation Reserve. The local website "Neighbour Next Door" regularly has post of dogs going missing on Mount Macedon and in all surrounding towns, currently there are posts of dogs that have been found wandering around Gisborne. We see posts of dogs missing all the time. One post was for two very large Italian Mastiffs missing heading in the direction of the Regional Park. Support and

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sympathy posts followed, there were so many people concerned about the two lost dogs. One supportive post from Mount Macedon stated that their two large dogs had gone missing and were found after two weeks at the Macedon Winery on Bawden Road. These dogs were wandering in the Regional Park for two weeks, how much damage did they do?

Tourists are bringing their fur babies up to Mount Macedon to experience the visitor experience on visiting the open gardens. While these precious pets are kept on leads, the owners do not pick up after their dogs, this also occurs with locals walking their dogs. Also visitors, while walking on our road reserves, if they pass a residential property with a local dog behind the gate, there is usually a screaming session of dogs barking at each other, another contributer to the loss of our amenity. There are also concerns about the amount of dogs visiting the Regional Park with visitors. Dogs appear in increasing numbers at the tea rooms, on walking tracks, Sanitorium Lake and on Mount Towrong with many dogs off leads.

The MRSC Biodiversity Strategy 2018 makes the following statement under the heading- 6. Threats Facing Biodiversity – Domestic dogs can impact on the behaviour, dispersal and survival of native animals. This includes through their scent which can discourage some native species from staying in an area, and direct chasing and predation.

# **Stanley Park**

At Stanley Park Conservation Reserve, on Mount Macedon, is a location with a considerable amount of fauna on site all the time, things are not much better. There are 14 signs around the reserve informing visitors that dogs must be on a lead, these are always ignored by both visitors and locals. The MRSC Biodiversity Strategy, makes comments on dogs in sensitive areas, see above. Recently, dogs off leads are witnessed all the time. Visitors and locals claim that they didn't know that there was such a regulation. At times, locals walking their dogs feel that they do not have to abide by this Local Law. One local stated that her voice is her lead. She is seen in the reserve regularly with her dog off lead.

Stanley Park is a location where in the first instance the reserve desperately needs more visible signage advising visitors that their dogs must be on a lead. In the second instance, dog visitaion needs to be reviewd as to whether dogs should be allowed in the reserve at all, this for the protection of the fauna that lives and visits there.



This new sign appeared on the Corner of Mount Macedon Road and Anzac Road earlier this year. I have not seen this sign anywhere else in the Shire or on Mount Macedon. Stanley Park would in the short term benefit of having this sign in the Conservation Reserve at all entrances until further consederations are made about Stanley Park and dogs on leads.

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# Aditional concerns.

There is nother emerging problem is that is occuring on Mount Macedon in recent years. We are seeing new residents now bringing in very large dogs, there are so many very large dogs up here now. Many properties on Mount Macedon are on acreage, 1. acre to 25acres. Properties with large dogs allow the dogs to have free movement over the full property and their movements are not supervised. All of Mount Macedon including private properties are wildlife corridors. I have noticed that where I live, wild life that previously frequented both my garden and surrounding properties are no longer there. I always had two koalas annually on neighbouring properties and in my garden, but since the new owners aquired two very large dogs that have access to the whole property the koalas no longer visit. At times I can hear these dogs racing down the full length of their acreage barking all the way down to the creek at 4.00am. I would like to ask council to consider that property owners have a fenced back yard up to ¼ acre for their dogs on a day to day basis so that they can't wander everyehere and have impact on wildlife, they can then have them on leads when walking over the rest of their acreage. Our wildlife needs protection to protect their habitat and survive.

This concludes my submission on the Draft MRSC Budget for 2023-2024.

I present supporting reasons and documents to assist Councillors with their decision.

The 2024/2025 Budget Submission is summarised by the following main points,

- There was an allocation of \$50k for works in the 2019/2020 Budget that has been used to fund part of the 'Stage 1' (Short Term Package 1) of the Ash Wednesday Park Masterplan (AWP). This section of "Stage 1" works has been partially completed.
- 2. A further \$100K of funding for "Stage 1 (Short Term Package 2)" was allocated towards the project in the 2021/2022 Budget. This section of "Stage 1" works has been partially completed during the 2023-2024 budget year. The reasons given, by Council staff, for the shortfall of funding for works specified in the Masterplan design was due to the increased cost of the works.
- This submission requests that a further \$100K be allocated in the 2024/2025
   Budget in order that we can facilitate the completion of the balance of works that are defined as "Stage 1" of the Masterplan and more specifically below,
  - (a) Item 1.04 Digital Sign depicting the history of the area and the Ash Wednesday Bushfires and their effects on the communities amidst the devastation of that time. Information could also depict places to visit of historic significance such as Hanging Rock, Open gardens etc. Redacted due to Privacy Reason

(b) Item 1.10 the Carpark Upgrade and placing of bollards to stop visitors using the park grounds and designated picnic areas for parking. The carparking area may be possible to fund via Councils Parks and Maintenance programs for existing infrastructure.

We ask the Councillors look at this Submission for allocation of \$100k in the Budget Papers favourably and support the submission.

Councillors have before them an opportunity to provide an injection of funds into a community asset to help to further improve, maintain and address important and well utilised Park and playground which is a focal recreation destination point in the Macedon township. The location is walking distance to the Macedon Transport hub and Village shopping precinct.



Ash Wednesday Park Master Plan

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# Introduction

The Ash Wednesday Park master plan has been developed by Council with the Macedon community in 2019 and 2020.

The master plan is to provide guidance for future development of the park, and, as best practice, takes a holistic view of the public open space in this area that is managed by Council. As a result the master plan considers both the actual parcel of land Ash Wednesday Park sits on and the public open space towards Jubilee Hall.

The master plan considers the preservation of the natural environmental attributes, capturing and showcasing the history of the park which encompasses Indigenous heritage/culture, Ash Wednesday fires, and the connectivity between points of interest (train station, public toilets, Jubilee Hall, primary school, Macedon township and Mount Players Theatre etc.) and the park.

A copy of the master plan is included as an appendix to this report, along with supporting documents such as costed, staged implementation plan, planting schedule and materials palette.

### Vision

The master plan lays out an approach to the improvement of Ash Wednesday Park over the next 10 to 20 years. The intention is to preserve and regenerate the ecological value of the park, while improving visitor facilities in a considered and appropriate way. This plan aims to pay respect to the history of the park, including its purpose as a place of memorial.

# Background

Ash Wednesday Park is a small yet important park located on Smith Street in Macedon with adjoining Council managed open space towards Jubilee Hall also used by the community albeit as a bush land area. Council is the land owner and manager of the park with adjacent land ownership shared with VicTrack, Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning and private residents.

The park is classified as a district level playground in Council's Playground Strategy 2009-2014 and is well used by local residents and visitors due to the natural shade, serenity and close proximity to the township, train station, Jubilee Hall and Mount Players Theatre.

Current facilities include a barbecue shelter, playground, drinking fountain and multiple picnic settings and park benches. The closest public toilets are located 125m away, further along Smith Street opposite the Macedon Railway Hotel. Jubilee Hall is also located within the Park and is managed by the Macedon Ranges Community Halls Inc.

Council's Open Space Strategy 2013 outlines a priority project for Macedon/Mount Macedon to 'prepare a master plan for Ash Wednesday Park.

Council's Sport and Active Recreation Strategy 2018-2028 outlines a key direction of the Macedon/Mount Macedon district to 'continue to work with the local community to explore opportunities to establish a significant play space/community hub (e.g. multipurpose stage, amphitheatre, picnic areas and play space). The strategy also includes action 1.1.2 'implement priority recommendations from the Shire's Open Space Strategy including... preparing a master plan for Ash Wednesday Park in Macedon.'

In 2018, the Macedon and Mt Macedon Business and Tourism Association ('MMMBATA') made a submission to Council's budget process and were successful in securing funding towards the development of a master plan to guide future development for the park.

Pollen Studio were engaged to develop both a master plan and a costed, staged implementation plan.

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# Consultation

Pollen Studio and Council have worked closely with the local community throughout the consultation process, to develop a master plan which reflects many views and priorities amongst the local residents.

# **Brainstorming session**

An initial brainstorming session was facilitated by Pollen Studio and provided an opportunity for residents to create their wish list for Ash Wednesday Park and to help inform the draft master plan.

Overall, a high level of priority was placed on retaining the natural bush setting of the park, improving existing conditions and use. Suggestions included:

- Park etiquette signage (pick up after your dog, no heat bead barbecues, take rubbish home etc.)
- Signage to inform ecology of the park (species of trees, wildlife in park)
- Infrastructure upgrades to include bike rack, bike repair station, outdoor fitness
  equipment, a stage with electricity, skate park, playground improvements,
  extension of shelter and barbecue facilities, inclusion of a public toilet
- Monument to reflect Ash Wednesday fires memorial
- Changes to parking to create accessible and minibus parking, installation of bollards
- Improved drainage and formalization of water way, including upgrade of bridge crossing
- Improved weed management and revegetation areas, including potential bush tucker planting
- Improved connectivity between train station/viaduct and Jubilee Hall/primary school. Including internal walking paths between regeneration areas.

# Walk-shop

After consideration from internal Council departments, the ideas and suggestions discussed at the brainstorming session were collated to inform a first draft master plan, which was subsequently presented to local residents at an onsite 'walk-shop' facilitated by Pollen Studio.

Members of the community engaged in a walking tour and open discussions/debate on the elements included in the updated plan. It also provided an opportunity for both Pollen Studio and Council officers to engage in discussions regarding the rationale behind why certain elements and facilities were included/excluded from the first draft master plan.

Discussion topics and feedback included:

- Effects of redevelopment and increasing capacity of the park
- Inclusion of skate friendly elements (e.g. Steel rimmed curbs or bollards) within the park, rather than a skate park facility
- General consensus on location of the stage, with an emphasis on a multipurpose structure
- Regeneration boundaries and maintaining open grassy areas
- Dispersing facilities around the shelter to avoid congestion and reduce risk with high pedestrian and car traffic
- Removable bollards to reduce vehicle access to inner road, creating flat space for bike/scooters etc. yet ability to open in busy periods
- Some support for the inclusion of a public toilet.

Each person in attendance was provided the opportunity to vote on their priorities for the park which has helped inform the staged implementation plan.

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# **Public Exhibition of Draft Master Plan**

Council resolved at its meeting on 23 October 2019 to approve the draft master plan for a four week period of community consultation in November 2019.

The draft master plan underwent a period of community consultation over a four week period from 4 November to 30 November 2019, which included:

- Comments sought on Council's 'Have Your Say' web page
- Comment sought directly from those on the established stakeholder contact list including previous submitters
- Promotion via Council's social media.

All feedback received has been considered by Council's environment, parks and recreation officers and the consultants in terms of guiding the final master plan, with the following key changes made to the document:

- Inclusion of car park upgrade works into the master plan implementation plan as item 1.10
- Inclusion of weed management as part of the project description for items 1.02 and 1.09 in the master plan implementation plan so as to re-emphasise the importance of this work
- Revision of the master plan plant list and indicate that these are guidelines and subject to final approval by the relevant authorities at implementation
- Clarification on the need to undertake further investigations and seek approvals
  when determining the final precise location of the proposed multi-purpose stage
- Clarification on the ongoing annual maintenance cost for assets developed through the master plan, noting more accurate assessment of future maintenance costs should be undertaken as part of future detailed design and implementation
- Various formatting updates required to finalise the master plan.

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# **Implementation**

Pollen Studio have provided a draft staged and costed implementation plan to inform the execution of the master plan. A materials palette and planting guidelines also accompanies the master plan to provide visual guidance at the detailed design stage.

It is important to note that once items are funded the detailed design process is to include:

- Any authority guidelines, approvals and consultation as required and amending the works in regards to these. As examples, the advice of Melbourne Water in terms of details relating to treatment and plantings near the creek areas through the park. The advice of the gas supply authority in terms of the proposed stage and proximity to the gas supply line.
- The approval of Council's environmental and parks teams and Melbourne Water of the details of any plantings at the implementation stage prior to the sourcing of plants. The planting guidelines provide initial guidance.

# Stage one

Council's 2019/2020 budget includes an allowance of \$50,000 to commence the implementation of stage one works as identified in the draft implementation plan, which has been developed in consideration of the priorities outlined by the community at the walk-shop.

Based on the outcomes of the community consultation undertaken so far, this includes improvements to the entertainment area, being the construction of a multipurpose stage/platform and drainage and other improvements to the open grassy area.

Once the final draft master plan has been considered by Council, detailed design for stage one works will commence in 2020.

# **Ongoing**

Based on the estimates provided in the draft implementation plan the development of all stages would cost in excess of \$200,000. The master plan has been developed to provide guidance for the development of the park over the next decade and will require a range of funding sources to support full implementation.

The annual maintenance cost of assets developed through the master plan should be calculated at industry levels which is currently 2 per cent of total investment cost. An accurate assessment of future maintenance costs should be undertaken as part of future detailed design and implementation.

Once finalised, Council officers will encourage the community to use the master plan to apply for different funding streams available through Council, State and Federal Governments or other funding programs.

Community groups will also be encouraged to take ownership in progressing the plan i.e. Landcare hosting community planting days to implement the revegetation phases of the master plan.

The following reasons are provided in support of the budget submission,

A. Relocate the Bus Shelter away from the EV Station and the corner of Smith and Victoria Street

Since the new EV Charging Station has been completed and whilst the project and its' completion must be commended it has provided safety issues because,

- (i) The EV and Parking location is where the bus stop shelter is and has been located (for many years) for school children and other transport user to easily be in a common, safe location
- (ii) The Bus Shelter should be and have clear (and appropriate) designated signage visible and away from the exposure and conflict with motor cars parking and or using the EV Charging posts.
- (iii) The Bus Shelter should be moved to the southern end of the public toilet block and adequate 'pick up' space provided for buses to stop and to be off the through carriage way lanes
- (iv) This safety issue has been created by the location of the EV Charging station and dedicated parking spaces.

## B. Address parking at the newly created parking spaces and specifically allocated to the EV Station

Since the new EV Charging Sation has been completed whilst it is being well utilised it has created the following safety issues,

 Vehicles charging have been reversed into the locations which is an illegal practice and parking law in Victoria and the Vic Roads guidelines

(ii) Vehicles driving away after charging has completed are exiting the parking spot in a forward motion and into oncoming traffic (travelling at up to legal speeds of 60kmph). This is a dangerous practice because the oncoming traffic is close from an approaching 'blind corner' and the close proximity of the Charging facility near the main intersection where bus and truck traffic is regularly passing during each day. Appropriate signage or other means of ensuring the safety at this location is recommended. There are regulations for refuelling of vehicles and their safe movement before and after refuelling.

#### C. Jubilee Hall Mural - Protection artworks and surface

The Mural in the room at Jubilee Hall has been at the location since it was first designed and created by location historians Ms C. Redacted due to Privacy Reasons after the Ash Wednesday Bushfires (1983). The artwork was created to depict the burning mountain (Mt. Macedon) and the creating was completed using materials that had been through the intense bushfire heat which allowed glass and other items, from properties in the area, to melt and weld themselves together.

- (i) The mural surface is showing signs of wear because of its' age and constant exposure to light, temperatures within the hall (especially with the previous open flames gas heaters) and other factors.
- (ii) The Mural should have a protective cover such as perspex or glass fabricated to protect the surface and unique character of the artistic sculpture.
- (iii) The Mural should in no way be lost to our history and the capacity of new residents and future generation to enjoy the artwork. It is the only one of its kind that MMMBATA is aware of

#### Conclusion

We ask the Councillors look at this Submission for allocation of funds in the Budget Papers favourably and support the submission.

As one of the Macedon Ranges Shire residents, with a particular focus on our patch of Gisborne, New Gisborne, Riddells Creek, Macedon, Mount Macedon and Bullengarook.

for more than became especially evident during the COVID lockdowns where dog parks became central to both dog and human mental health.

Last week at a local business breakfast I had the pleasure of having a conversation with Mayor Death about the possibility of our partnering with MRSC to fund fenced dog parks in our community.

We briefly discussed two options as priorities:

- 1. Adding some gates to the Clifford Reserve/Greene St Macedon oval, which is currently designated off-lead. This oval only needs gates added to make the whole oval a fenced dog park as it already has cyclone wire fencing around its perimeter.
- 2. Creating a fenced dog park on the green space behind the Gisborne council offices. This space is already designated off-lead but is not really utilised by anyone (having observed this on multiple occasions). There is ample space to create a proper fenced, dedicated dog run there where people could safely train their dogs and have them socialise without fear of them being able to run away.

Melbourne Council recently installed temporary dog park fencing in a similar-sized space in West/North Melbourne. I've visited it a number of times while in the city with my dogs and it was very well used. Perhaps MRSC could consider such a trial in partnership with the Bendigo Bank?

While there are now designated off-lead areas in the Ranges, they are almost all sports fields and obviously sports have priority. Creating this space away from the sports fields will reduce the risk of interactions between people playing sports and dogs and reduce dog waste on the ovals too.

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Another potential spot for a fenced dog play area is

Dogs are an essential part of so many lives in the Macedon Ranges. They are integral to the good mental health of thousands of residents, yet MRSC has done nothing to support dogs and their owners beyond providing some dog waste bag units.

Given how many people live in the area without children but with dogs, what services are being provided for these residents? They are not accessing children's playgrounds, kindergartens etc but are still paying rates. Residents shouldn't have to travel 27km to Sunbury to get to their closest fenced dog park when there is an abundance of parkland readily available in our Shire that just needs some fencing. At what point do these residents get their needs taken into consideration with the same weight as families with young children?

We appreciate that the Council has limited funding and that is why we are interested in partnering with you on this project, along with the other projects on which we are already collaborating.

The quick win at Clifford Reserve/Greene St Macedon could be actioned with minimal effort or cost and would be immensely valued by people. We are keen to move on this ASAP.

We would be happy to meet with you to discuss this further.

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## **PROJECT PROPOSAL**

# Canopy over Bowling Green to enable Year-Round Bowling



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#### WHO WE ARE

Redacted due to Privacy Reasons Club Inc. is centrally located in Gisborne at 1 Kilmore Road, a few minutes' walk from Gisborne's main shopping area and surrounded by attractive parkland next to Jacksons Creek

The Club was first formed in 1962 when the clubhouse consisted of a small bark rotunda. The rotunda was eventually replaced with a weatherboard clubhouse which, after surviving three major floods, was destroyed by fire in 1994. Members were then accommodated for the following two years in relocatable huts with portable toilets until a decision was made to purchase Macedon House across the road and this property served as the clubhouse for the next three years.

A new clubhouse was constructed on the original site and the move into the current building took place in 1999. A new synthetic green was constructed in 2015 funded by \$100,000 from the State Government and \$250,000 from Club members (which the Club was repaying \$50,000 per annum). The amount funded by members was fully repaid by 31 March 2020, in just 5 years.

A second new synthetic green is being constructed in 2022, funded by \$245,000 from the State Government, \$55,000 from Macedon Ranges Shire Council, and \$68,000 from the Club. Further, an expanded carpark is being constructed at the same time.



In 2014, prior to the construction of the first synthetic green, the Club had 80 members. Since that time the Club's membership has grown to 112 members (34 women and 78 men) and 100 "barefoot bowlers". It is expected that membership numbers will continue to grow with enhanced facilities and the fact that Gisborne is in a growth area.

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The Club has a cross section of members. In fact, one of our members is the former State Junior Champion, while the Club's oldest member aged in his 90's still plays pennant bowls.

The Club has achieved recent success. The Club was Premiers in the Central Highlands Division in 1st Division in 2016/17 and 2017/18, and in 2nd Division 2017/18. In addition, the Club was Premiers in Midweek 1st Division in 2020/21, with that team winning the Central Victorian Championship and finishing 3rd in the State Championship.

In 2021/22, the Club was Premiers in the new Highlands Playing Area in 3<sup>rd</sup> Division and Midweek 1<sup>st</sup> Division. The latter went on to win the Ballarat Highlands Bowls Region Championship and the ultimate – the Victorian State Midweek Pennant Championship.



The Club has enhanced its corporate governance which includes implementing: new constitution; board charter; board committee charters; directors' skill mix (which includes the aim to have an appropriate gender balance); and a board and board committee code of conduct. Further, a formal lease of the Crown Land on which the Club is situated has been entered into. The lease retains the leasehold improvements in the ownership of the Club.

A range of policies have also been developed, covering among other things, fair play, player and spectator codes of conduct, health and safety, and child safety. In addition, a strategic plan and a risk management plan have been developed by the Club.

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#### WHAT WE WANT TO DO

Redacted due to Privacy Reasons g Club wants to construct a canopy over the synthetic bowling green to provide year-round bowling. Currently the majority of bowling only occurs for 7 months of the year.

Such a development will give virtually complete protection and would enable the Club and its members, and visiting players to keep playing bowls come wind, rain, hail or shine, whatever the time of the day or night, and whatever season of the year come winter or summer.

The canopies are a solid and dependable structure with a life expectancy of over 35 years.



This regionally significant development would provide significant physical and mental health, social, economic, and environmental benefits to the community of Gisborne and the region, and increase female participation in the game of bowls.



The construction of a canopy at Gisborne is in line with Bowls Victoria's strategic intent for covering of greens across the State (Refer Appendix 1). Bowls Victoria has advised that the Hume and Macedon Ranges area does not have sufficient covered greens to cater for demand, particularly when compared to similar growth corridors elsewhere in Greater Melbourne.


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#### WHY WE WANT TO DO IT

A canopy over the synthetic bowling green will:

- > promote physical and mental health and wellbeing benefits by enabling:
  - those that are retired (that make up a large proportion of those that play bowls) to remain active all year round. The physical and mental health benefits are derived from participating in the game of bowls into older age, and from the strategic thinking required to play the game;
  - 2) the fostering of increased participation of females in the game of bowls due to the enhanced bowling conditions;
  - those that work, a greater opportunity to play either socially or in competitions all year round, including at night after work;
  - 4) those that are at school/university (there is a growing number of younger players) would be provided a greater opportunity to participate in the game of bowls via school sports/learner bowls programs and in competitions with guaranteed facilities in all weather conditions;
  - 5) those with a disability a more suitable facility to enable physical activity by playing bowls;
  - 6) those linked with businesses to undertake corporate bowls events (competitive or social) and utilise the Club's function room;
  - 7) the venue to be rain and wind proof, and sun-safe, and therefore enable bowls to be played in all weather conditions (rain and extreme heat). Further, the canopy reduces the heat effect radiating from the synthetic playing surface; and
  - 8) The fostering of connections between team and club members all year round, which clearly extends beyond the green, including a safe social space for women to participate in bowls and other associated activities, especially if they no longer have a partner.

provide a social benefit in a major growing community as it will enable bowls to also be played during the winter months and at night and enhance the opportunity for greater community participation in the game of bowls. With a greater opportunity for participation, research has disclosed that bowling clubs facilitate long lasting friendships that are often a central feature of the social network for older people.

People with a disability and students by playing bowls not only provides an avenue for physical activity but, equally important, another avenue for social connection.

With the installation of a canopy over the synthetic green, participation levels are anticipated to increase by approximately 30 per cent.

- > provide an **economic benefit** as it would enable:
  - more bowling events to be played and accordingly an increased number of visitors to the area and increased patronage of local businesses. We believe this will increase awareness of the region as a travel and tourism destination;
  - 2) the Clubs associated with the Highlands Playing Area to play competitions all year round and bring revenue to the district. The Gisborne and District Bowling Club is part of the Highlands Playing Area which consists of clubs from Kyneton, Kyneton Golf, Woodend, Trentham, Diggers Rest, Macedon, Romsey, Lancefield, Kilmore, and Broadford;
  - 3) with increased bowling events during the day and at night (at the Club social and competition, regional and State level) and guaranteed game scheduling in winter and summer with a waterproof and UV block-out canopy, the Club to generate increased social and full membership fees and general revenue;

- 4) high profile Bowls Tournament opportunities, such as a major regional and/or State female and/or male bowling events to be played during the winter months using the combined resources of Gisborne and Sunbury. The area would be a major attraction for such events due to not only the bowling facility but also the close proximity to the airport and Melbourne via rail and the freeway; and
- 5) bowlers from the Loddon Mallee region to play in the winter months. There is no Bowling facility in the Loddon Mallee region that has a cover over their bowling green.

#### > provide **environmental benefit** by:

- 1) catching water run-off, via full guttering around the canopy, which can be stored in rainwater tanks for use at the bowling club);
- 2) the canopy extends the life span of the synthetic playing surface;
- the fabric is UV stabilised and will not deteriorate under sun exposure, and has the required tensile strength to resist severe storm events;
- 4) the fabric does not mould, resulting in lower maintenance costs;
- 5) the LED lights having lower running costs compared with over metal halide lights. Further, the LED lights reflect off the fabric roof which results in shadow-free bowling at night; and
- 6) the PVC translucent fabric does not need to run lights during sunny days, resulting in lower running costs.

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#### **HOW WE WANT TO DO IT**

The indicative cost to construct a canopy over the Club's synthetic green is \$980,000. (Light Weight Structures Architectural Solutions in June 2022 provided an indicative price range of \$930,000 to \$980,000 to construct this canopy. The Club has adopted the top end of the range in calculating the indicative cost as a contingency and cost escalation sum has not been included).

That price excludes costs associated with stormwater connection and Council fees associated with the development application documentation.

While the structure does not need lighting to play bowls during the day, the total cost of LED lighting, including all associated electrical work, to enable bowls to be played at night is \$54,000 which is included in the above indicative cost.

these Clubs have poker machines which have been used as the source of funding to construct their facilities.

The Redacted due to Privacy Reasons Club is a socially responsible poker machine-free community Club. Accordingly, the Club is seeking funds to the value of \$750,000 to construct a cover over Redacted due to Privacy Reasons Club synthetic bowling green which would be a great benefit for the region and the wider Victorian community.

The Club is seeking support to obtain funds from the following sources:

- 1. \$600,000 from the State Government Local Sports Infrastructure Fund.
- 2. \$150,000 from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council. This project is strategically supported by the Council's Sport and Active Recreation Strategy Supporting the Installation of "Australian standard sports lighting at synthetic lawn bowls rinks" (paragraph 3.1.17 on page 32) and "continue to encourage club development and support initiatives as required" (page 45).

The Redacted due to Privacy Reasons will contribute \$230,000, mainly via borrowings from a range of sources, including from members. The Club will seek local community grants of up to \$100,000 as a means of further reducing the exposure to debt financing by the Club. Based on recent debt repayment history it is expected that this amount will be repaid within 5 years.

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Re: Covering of Bowling Greens across the State

see covered greens as vital to enabling all year-round play. Our strategic intent for the covering of bowling greens has a focus on both Greater Melbourne and key regional cities.

Our intent is to have covered greens in the 10 largest regional cities: Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Horsham, Latrobe, Mildura, Shepparton, Wangaratta, Warrnambool and Wodonga.

For Greater Melbourne, the strategic intent is to have covered bowling greens at major bowls centres with additional importance placed on growth areas. This will:

- 1. facilitate year-round participation and use
- 2. enhance the image of the sport
- 3. provide a more inclusive environment, particularly for persons with a disability
- 4. enable broader community health outcomes
- 5. increase social connectedness
- 6. provide economic benefits to the area/region
- 7. encourage new participants (social and traditional) and increase participation numbers
- 8. keep older Australians (e.g. over 60 years) active all year round
- 9. increase female participation in the sport
- 10. facilitate bowls being played as part of school sport programs in all weather conditions
- 11. meet increased demand in areas encountering significant population growth.

We currently have covered greens in most areas, with more either under construction or in the planning phase. One area that does not have sufficient covered greens to cater for demand is the Hume and Macedon Ranges area, particularly when compared to similar growth corridors e.g. Casey and the South East corridor, which has five undercover facilities and more planned.

The Redacted due to Privacy Reasons Club's project which seeks funding to construct a year-round bowling facility is timely with the significant population growth in the Gisborne area which would result in a major community asset providing significant benefits to the Macedon Ranges.
