

Equine Land Management Grazing Course

The Equine Land Management Grazing Course forms part of the *Healthy Landscapes - Practical Regenerative Agricultural Communities* program which aims to raise awareness about sustainable land management practices that improve soil health, reduce exposure to climate risk, enhance biodiversity and increase productivity.

About the course

The Course has been designed to assist land managers to improve their skills and knowledge about grazing horses, resulting in an increase in horse health, less weeds, lower purchase feed and an increase in perennial pasture species, including native species.





Face to face theory learning, Practical on-property learning and an individualised property visit.



Who is the course for?

The course is structured for large and small landholders with grazing horses of all sizes. Landholders in the Macedon Ranges Shire, Hepburn Shire, Mount Alexander Shire or the City of Greater Bendigo are eligible to attend.

Cost

The cost of the course is \$75 per property (up to two participants). We would encourage two members of the property decision making team to attend. Afternoon tea is supplied.

Venue

It will be held on an equine property in Lockwood South (between Bendigo and Maldon).
