Acknowledgment of Country

Council context

Cool Changes is a Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC) program that works with local communities across the shire to facilitate the development of local climate change action plans.

Cool Changes commenced in 2019 with a pilot project: Sustainable Malmsbury and has since gone on to help create community-led, place-based climate action plans in Woodend, Romsey & Lancefield and Riddells Creek.

Understanding the vital role communities play in helping everyone adapt and mitigate climate change, the actions identified throughout the program will be used to influence the upcoming shire-wide Climate Emergency Response Plan.

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Our Plan

The Macedon Ranges Shire Council officially released a Declaration of Climate Emergency in March 2021, with this declaration the community of Gisborne understand the urgency that goes hand in hand with an emergency. With various Landcare & Friends groups, community groups and strong local businesses there is great opportunity to create collective, impactful climate action that is able to move with the urgency needed during an emergency.

This plan aims to create a collective vision for climate action into the future and provide new, passionate residents a document in which to refer to when eager to continue the care and connection to Gisborne shown by many in years past.

This plan also assists to identify gaps in local action and infrastructure and help to contribute to social cohesion in the town. Throughout this process, participants often spoke of the Gisborne 'identity' and if a Community Climate Action Plan could help shape this identity.

How the plan was developed

The following plan was developed using multiple engagement and collaboration methods. Starting with a town-wide survey, consultation with local environmental groups and then three sequential workshops. Throughout these three workshops, community members explored localised impacts of climate change and local actions that addressed both

impacts and township vulnerabilities (see Appendix 3). Also eager to recognise the hard-work that has been happening in Gisborne for many years, township assets were also identified throughout the process (see Appendix 4). These workshops continued to build the momentum with each week and ignited great discussion and passion amongst everyone involved.



To assist with dealing with the complexity of climate change, impacts, vulnerabilities and assets were grouped into themes. These themes were then used to allow people to contribute to areas of passion and expertise.

The group were able to unanimously decide that goals were needed before actions were explored and, as such, three goals formed against the triple bottom line framework; 'social', 'environment' and 'economic' (see page 6).

Once goals were finalised, an initial list of 41 actions were identified by the community as possible local climate actions that could happen within Gisborne. From this list, the group then identified 7 priority actions to implement (see Appendix 2 for full list).



How to get involved

Community climate action can be performed by anyone! You do not need to be an expert, just some eagerness to participate and join the journey.

This Plan has been created <u>by</u> the community and will rely <u>on</u> the community to implement it. Through collaboration with one another, local businesses and industry as well as local Council, each action identified is well within reach of being achieved.

When developing the actions we tried to assign action 'leaders' to help drive the action forward. If an action has a leader, you are free to contact them directly. If an action doesn't have a leader or appears in the future actions list and you're interested in learning more please reach out. Also, remember that this Plan captures the community's thinking at a point in time and that community goals, actions and ideas will naturally evolve over time. If you have other ideas for projects and the willingness to kickstart them, we encourage you to do so.

Together, we can continue to care for people and climate into the future!

How is this plan going to be implemented?

The exact method of implementing is yet to be confirmed. Once this Plan is reviewed for the Gisborne community, participants will come back together to discuss the best method of keeping this Plan on track. Options that have been put forward to the group are:


- 1. Decentralised model: No overarching coordination of the Plan. Essentially the delivery of the Plan will focus on each Lead managing their actions. People will continue to collaborate through information communication channels and quarterly meetings.
- 2. Join the Macedon Ranges Sustainability Group (MRSG): Gisborne to join the MRSG as a locality-based action group, similar to Sustainable Malmsbury
- 3. New place-based environmental group: Create an entirely new group with a centralised 'steering' committee.



Our approach & themes

Climate change is a complex issue and the Gisborne community clearly understand its inter-disciplinary complexities. Through the mapping of local impacts, township vulnerabilities and assets, the group were able to identify themes in which to use as a focus tool.

The group also opted to create guiding goals for the plan. These goals worked well to offer a criterion for actions to be included in the current plan.

To have Gisborne homes, businesses and public building be fully powered by renewable energy, with ambitions for Gisborne to have net zero emissions on electricity usage by 2030.






FIGURE 1: CLIMATIC CHANGES AND THE LIKELY LOCAL IMPACTS. SOURCE: DWELP, LODDON MALLEE REGIONAL CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTATION SNAPSHOT.




FIGURE 2: OUTLINE OF SHIRE-WIDE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS

The impact of climate change within the shire is likely to follow the patterns forecast for other parts of the Loddon Campaspe region and Victoria more broadly.

Within the shire, **species adapted to the cooler** temperatures of higher elevations are likely to be most vulnerable, such as Snow Gums and the wet forests of Mount Macedon.

Farmers within the shire will need to adapt to the drier conditions, Council operations will need to respond to more frequent storm events, fires and hot days which impact outdoor work, while the community more broadly will need to build resilience to more heat waves and increased emergencies.






